Omniplex Affiliated Fund Is Set *Five Trustees Are Selected*

The board of trustees of the Omniplex has joined the Oklahoma City Community Foundation in establishing the Omniplex Affiliated Fund. The \$1 million Omniplex Endowment Fund was transferred to this Affiliated Fund at the Community Foundation on July 1, 1987.

Trustees of the new Affiliated Fund at OCCF are Dr. William W. Talley II and Michael Stewart, named by Omniplex, and Dan Hogan III, Polly Nichols and Jack White, named by the Community Foundation.

The Affiliated Fund is a separately incorporated organization which is governed by its own group of trustees. The Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws are jointly approved by both organizations. The trustees are able to monitor the investment of the funds and to distribute the income of the fund to Omniplex, a hands-on science and art museum within the Kirkpatrick Center.

The Trust Department of Liberty National Bank and Trust Company is serving as fiscal trustee for the Omniplex Fund

and provides all the investment services.

The Omniplex board of trustees chose to use the Affiliated Fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation to separate its endowment fund from direct control by its board of directors and to utilize the administrative and investment services provided by the Community Foundation.

"The endowment will be protected from invasion and will be managed in a more consistent

way than it has been previously," said Dr. Talley, former president of the Omniplex board.

This is the second Affiliated Fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation," said Nancy B. Anthony, Foundation executive director, who added, "and it's the first for a non-profit organization." Further information about establishing an Affiliated Fund at the Community Foundation is available from Mrs. Anthony.

'Sharing Exchange' Due in November

A unique publication spotlighting the small and mid-sized direct service agencies with Designated Funds at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation will make its debut in November, according to Nancy B. Anthony, executive director of the Foundation.

Called "The Sharing Exchange," the publication is a joint project of the Kirkpatrick Foundation and the Community Foundation. Said Mrs. Anthony, "It will briefly describe the activities and purposes of more than 80 Oklahoma City non-profit organiza-

Distributions Listed

Each September, the trustees of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation distribute the earnings of Designated Funds to more than 100 organizations. These earnings are generated by contributions to the Community Foundation which have been specified to benefit the individual agencies. All contributions which have been donated for the benefit of a specific organization are accounted for

in a Designated Fund. The earnings distribution for the 1986-87 fiscal year is based on 7.5 percent of the average balance in the Designated Fund.

The total distribution to the agencies from the Designated Fund is \$1,019,044.48, according to Nancy B. Anthony, executive director of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation.

Education Project Features Territorial Period Harn Homestead, Gardens in the Spotlight

April 22, 1989, will mark the 100th anniversary of the Great Land Run which settled Oklahoma City overnight. One of the organizations for whom this anniversary is especially significant is the Harn Homestead and Gardens at 313 N.E. 16th.

This unique homestead is being developed into a prototype of the Territorial Period. Funding from the Oklahoma Foundation for the Humanities, Robert S. and Grayce B. Kerr Foundation, the Noble Foundation, the Kirkpatrick Foundation, along with the Community Foundation, has helped generate renewed interest in this historical site.

The 1889ers Society initiated the project of restoring the home of William Fremont Harn. The home and accompanying 9.3 acres of grounds were given to the City of Oklahoma City by Mr. Harn's niece, Miss Florence O. Wilson, in 1967. The 1889ers and the City operated the house as a museum until 1985.

A lack of city funding caused the property to be transferred in 1986 to the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation. It was then leased to the newly formed William Fremont Harn Homestead and '89er Museum, which along with the 1889ers now open the museum to the public.

Mrs. Frank Johnson Hightower is president of the board of the Harn Gardens and Billie Jean Hunter is the current president of the 1889ers. According to

Marilyn Myers, director of the Kirkpatrick Foundation, "Funds can be granted for worthwhile projects but a strong coalition of volunteers is essential for the success of this and other non-profit endeavors." A special event to solicit volunteers is planned for October 4 at the homestead grounds. "We're calling it 'stake a claim day' and we think it will be quite festive," Mrs. Myers said. "We have a strong educational program on the books," Mrs. Myers continued. With assistance from the Oklahoma Foundation for the Humanities, the Harn Homestead has put together a program for fourth graders which already is under way. In the works are programs for both junior and senior high school students.

The members of the '89ers organization had acquired most of the furniture now on display in the home but the board of trustees is seeking additional furnishings for both the house and the barn.

Currently the museum is open to the public from 10 until 4 Tuesday through Saturday and from 1 until 4 on Sundays. Executive director is Debbi Owens.

"The Oklahoma City Community Foundation is proud to be a part of the restoration of such an historic site and particularly pleased that the restoration will be in place in time for Oklahoma City's Centennial," said Nancy B. Anthony, Foundation director.

Trustees Approve Designated Funds

At its August 11, 1987, meeting, the trustees of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation approved four new Designated Funds within the Foundation. The four are:

1. CONTACT of Metropolitan Oklahoma City, a 24-hour telephone line that provides crises counseling and other one-on-one listening assistance. CONTACT also operates the Hunger-Shelter Clearinghouse, an information exchange serving the hunger-shelter providers in the city. The fund was started with a donation from the Kirkpatrick Foundation.

2. Central Oklahoma Association for the Deaf and Hearing Impaired (COAD-HI), a coordination and referral agency for services for hearing-impaired persons. The fund was begun with a donation from the Kirkpatrick Foundation.

3. Central Branch, Young Men's Christian Association, the branch YMCA which serves downtown Oklahoma City. The fund was established through a

contribution by Mr. and Mrs. Ray Potts.

4. Villa Teresa School, Pre-Schools and Nurseries, an elementary school and preschool child care program serving the central part of Oklahoma City. The fund was started by the Carmelite Sisters of Saint Therese of the Infant Jesus. The contribution also established Name Funds in memory of Sister Hildegard Roan, Sister Antoinette Morry and Paul Michael Rockne.

Conference Set

The Support Center in Oklahoma City is sponsoring a statewide non-profit conference Sept. 21 at the Skirvin Plaza Hotel in Oklahoma City. The program will begin at 11:30 p.m. with a luncheon when speaker will be Eugene Dorsey, president of the Gannett Foundation. Management workshops will follow.

tions. Additionally, it will give for each a short 'wish list' — items, services or unique needs that the agency seeks for its programs and activities."

The two major purposes of the publication are:

1. To inform the general public about the services provided by the non-profit organizations in the community. Readers of "The Sharing Exchange" will learn where these agencies are, who runs them and what they are doing.

2. To encourage contributions of all kinds to these organizations. While all can utilize cash donations, they have many other needs that can be provided by in-kind donations and volunteer services.

"The Sharing Exchange, which is being coordinated by Mary Streich for the Community Foundation, will be distributed as an insert in suburban newspapers. About 150,000 copies will be printed.

"All of these agencies make very significant contributions to the Oklahoma City community," said Mrs. Anthony. "They provide unique and essential services. We hope to encourage a greater range of contributions to these agencies. Many people have donations other than money that they could share," she continued. "We hope that 'The Sharing Exchange' will facilitate a greater sharing of resources."

O. June Allen, the widow of Oklahoma City oilman Featherstone Allen, died in February of 1987. The fund created by her estate will be named for Mrs. Allen and the earnings will be used for general charitable purposes as determined by the trustees of the Community Foundation.

Ethel Benedict, a well-known Oklahoma City business woman, operated A&B Automotive for many years. She died in December, 1986, and left the bulk of her estate to several charitable beneficiaries. The earnings of the Ethel Benedict Fund will be used for general charitable purposes.

Mrs. Edna Stanley and her husband, E.D. Stanley, operated a furniture store in Hobart, OK, for many years. Upon retirement, they moved to Oklahoma City. Mrs. Stanley later moved to a retirement home in Tulsa. After several bequests to relatives, the residual of Mrs. Stanley's estate will be used to create the "Mr. and Mrs. E.D. Stanley Fund," at the Community Foundation. The earnings will be used by the trustees to meet the needs of the community.

The William and Janet Johnson Fund at the Community Foundation will be used primarily for scholarship support. Mr. Johnson, a native of Minco, OK, worked for Shell Oil for many years prior to his death in 1980. Mrs. Johnson was born in the Choctaw Nation and grew up in Oklahoma. The Johnsons were very interested in providing assistance for students from Minco and for nursing students in Oklahoma. The Foundation will administer the earnings from their fund for the specified scholarships.

"Funds created by a trust or a will bequest provide a unique memorial," said Mrs. Anthony. "They continue to fund charitable activities for many years into the future. We remember the donors not only for the contributions their gifts provide but also for their foresight in providing for the future."
