

Leveling the Playing Field for Students With Special Learning Needs

Since 1985, the Donna Nigh Foundation has been changing the lives of Oklahoma's developmentally disabled citizens. In celebration of its 25th anniversary, the foundation awarded \$27,000 in grants to provide 10 digital whiteboards in classrooms that serve nearly 400 students with special learning needs.

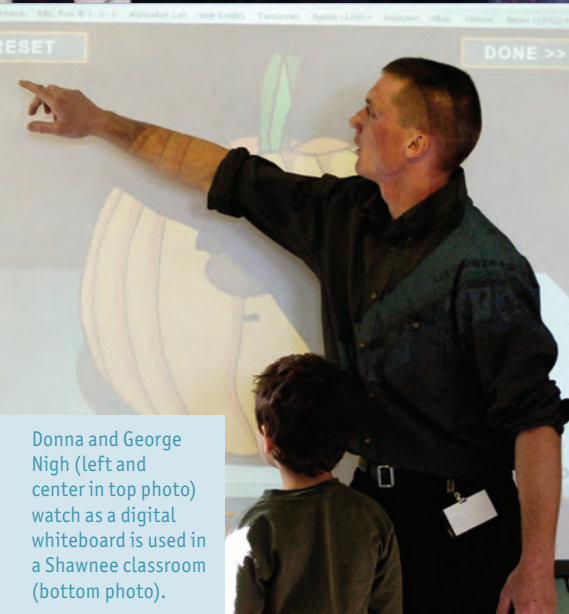
Digital whiteboards offer a multimedia presentation that is verbal, visual, auditory and interactive, all essential in drawing students into the subject matter. The grants will benefit classrooms in Adair, Antlers, Beggs, Duncan, Kingston, Oklahoma City, Sand Springs and Wagoner.

Central Fine Arts Academy is a K-2 school located in a high poverty area of Sand Springs. For special education teacher Aimee Whipple, the challenges her students face are magnified due to the lack of a familial structure that encourages learning. "In addition to their educational disabilities, many of my students also have very stressful home environments," she explains. Ms. Whipple says the digital whiteboard will help support the best possible learning environment for her students by offering a "hands on" approach.

"We may not be able to provide the actual learning experiences, but we can replicate them closely with technology," says Ms. Whipple, who intends to incorporate use of the whiteboard into her daily lesson plans. "I've seen whiteboards used in other special education classes and the uses are limitless."

"Over the past 25 years, we have been fortunate to assist many projects benefitting Oklahomans with disabilities," says Donna Nigh. "These grants will add important resources into the classrooms serving students with special learning needs and we are so pleased to be able to provide the whiteboards."

In 1998, administration of the Donna Nigh Foundation was transferred to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, ensuring that the Donna Nigh Foundation will continue to provide support for special Oklahomans in perpetuity.
