The Oklahoma City

Community Foundation is a non-profit organization established in 1969 to receive and administer funds for charitable purposes. It is a permanent distribution agency for funds donated to benefit health, education, cultural, and community services in the Oklahoma City area. Each year the earnings, and principal when so authorized, are distributed to tax-exempt agencies in the Oklahoma City area.

The Governing Board of nine prominent citizens is responsible for the management of the Foundation. The Fiscal Board representing the city's five largest banks is responsible for management of Foundation funds.

There are 350 community foundations in the United States. The first was established in Cleveland, Ohio in 1914. Growing in numbers and assets, community foundations have been called "The Wave of the Future." Oklahoma City is keeping pace.



ESTABLISHING A CHARITABLE FUND IN THE OKLAHOMA CITY COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

Living Donors

Individual Funds are established with an initial contribution of \$1,000 or more in cash, stocks, bonds, real estate, mineral interests, or any other certificate of ownership. The donor selects the name of his Fund and the trustee bank. The donor may make recommendations to the Governing Board for specific grants of income or principal. The income from each Fund is made available annually for distribution by the trustees to tax-exempt agencies in metropolitan Oklahoma City.

Testamentary Bequests

The greatest advantage of the Community Foundation is its ability to administer charitable bequests with the assurance that changing times and conditions will not make the funds obsolete. The growth of community foundations comes largely from donors who first become familiar with it by establishing Individual Funds, and who then provide permanent additions to such Funds in their Wills. High inheritance taxes and the difficulties of settling estates make the Community Foundation a desirable facility. Your money which would otherwise be dissipated can provide lasting support for our city's charitable needs.

Private Foundations

The restrictions upon private foundations imposed by the Tax Reform Act of 1969 have forced many to retrench or to terminate completely. Numerous smaller private foundations have found it advantageous to convey their assets to a permanent named Fund in a community foundation. The benefits of such transfers are substantial.

CONSIDER THE ADVANTAGES:

FOR THE DONOR:

SIMPLICITY

One gift, either by bequest or direct contribution, can benefit many different charitable programs.

TAX-SAVINGS

Maximum tax deductions are available from the Community Foundation, classified by the IRS as a "public charity". A donor may receive a deduction for full market value of long-term appreciated property up to 30% of adjusted gross income; may deduct contributions in excess of 50% of adjusted gross income; and, may receive a five-year carry-over for contributions in excess of 50%.

ECONOMY

Low administrative costs mean more money available for local charities. Commingled funds result in minimum trustee fees charged by the banks to the Community Foundation. Individual Funds are not charged with administrative or trustee fees.

PROTECTION

Professional grant investigation and the prudent judgment of the Governing Board assure the donor that his wishes will be adhered to as much as feasible. The trustees retain full authority to consider the overall wishes of the donor should the specifics no longer be appropriate.

RESPONSIVENESS

Examples of obsolescence are numerous, and account for several hundred million dollars in the United States being locked up in "dead hand" trusts. Agencies can change their character or go out of business. By contrast, the Community Foundation can adapt to continually changing needs.

FOR PRIVATE FOUNDATIONS:

Private foundations can merge into a community foundation by a final termination grant and receive the following benefits:

- 1) Trustees are relieved of further personal liability.
- Private foundations may recover the 4% excise taxes paid prior to the transfer as far back as 1969.
- Private foundations can avoid the termination tax levied against those wishing to dissolve.
- 4) The private foundation may maintain the distinctive identity and purposes of each transferred fund.
- 5) Funds in the Oklahoma City Community Foundation are not subject to tax on income or the minimum pay-out requirement required of private foundations by the Tax Reform Act of 1969.
- 6) Trustees of private foundations may maintain an advisory role suggesting disposition of income and principal from the funds which they create.

FOR THE PUBLIC:

The Community Foundation operates the only regional Foundation Center Library in the state. The collection has the most current Internal Revenue Service tax returns (Forms 990-AR and 990-PF) for all organizations filing as private foundations in Oklahoma. The Library includes information on national philanthropic foundations, and the grants they award; microfiche copies of published annual reports of American foundations; and other reference materials. Information is provided without charge to Library visitors and to persons who inquire by letter or telephone. The collection is available to the public by appointment Monday through Friday from 10 until 4.

At the end of the fiscal year net earnings of \$134,050 were available for distribution to charitable, educational and cultural organizations in the Oklahoma City area. In addition, principal of \$616,894 had been paid during the year to Boy Scouts of America, Last Frontier Council and Oklahoma Center for Science and Arts, Inc. (Kirkpatrick Center). The Distribution Subcommittee met in December and January to review suggestions by donors regarding the expenditure of earnings from funds they had established, requests for grants received by the Foundation during the year. and

Members of the Subcommittee were: Jack Abernathy, John E. Kirkpatrick, Dean A. McGee, Eleanor J. Maurer, and F. M. Petree.

Their suggestions were submitted to the entire Board of Trustees and the Fiscal Board who unanimously approved the final designations. The total amount distributed to local charities in fiscal 1976 was \$750,944.

THE GOVERNING BODY

The officers and trustees serve as the Distribution Committee and the Governing Body of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Each of the nine trustees is appointed for a term of three years.

Six members, a majority, are representative of public institutions. One is appointed by the City Council of Oklahoma City; one by the Provost of the University of

Oklahoma Health Sciences Center; and one by the Fiscal Board. One each is appointed by the presidents of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, United Appeal, and Oklahoma City University. The other three are appointed by the Trustees' Committee.

The members serve without compensation. They are selected for their integrity, leadership, and understanding of philanthropic needs. The three-year terms are staggered so that some appointments and reappointments are made each year. The Governing Body meets quarterly. Subcommittees on special problems meet more frequently. The full-time professional staff is located at 1300 North Broadway,

We have examined the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities and fund balances resulting from cash transactions of Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. at January 31, 1977, and 1976, and the related statements of changes in income fund balance and changes in investment fund balance for the years then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In our opinion, the statements referred to above present fairly the assets, liabilities and fund balances of Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. at January 31, 1977, and 1976, arising from cash transactions, and the changes in the income fund balance and investment fund balance for the years then ended, on a consistent basis.

NOTE 4 – BEQUEST RECEIVABLE

During the year ended January 31, 1975, the Foundation received a bequest of \$26,100 annually for a period of 15 years. The Foundation has unconditional rights to receive the bequest, which was recorded at present value at the date of the bequest, \$210,384. At January 31, 1976, the amount of \$207,133 includes \$11,725 of interest imputed on the bequest.

NOTE 5 - CONTINGENT LIABILITY

A commitment has been made against the funds in the Liberty National Bank – Science Center Trust and the Union Bank-Science Center Trust to cover the first phase of construction of a building for Oklahoma Center for Science and Arts, Inc. The commitment is for approximately \$1,300,000 and is to be paid by the end of March, 1977. As of January 31, 1977, \$607,217 has been paid against this commitment leaving a balance of \$692,783.

NOTE 6 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Federal Energy Administration has asserted that the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. has been overpaid by \$43,000 on their oil and gas sales. The Foundation is not in agreement with their decision and is studying its legal position.

KIRKPATRICK PLANETARIUM will soon move to the Oklahoma Center for Science & Arts, Inc.



KIRKPATRICK CENTER (OKLAHOMA CENTER FOR SCIENCE AND ARTS) will open in the fall of 1977. During 1976 the Community Foundation awarded grants of \$683,000 of income and principal for the first phase of construction.

The Center is governed by a statewide 16-member board, including the Governor, Mayor, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Oklahoma University, Oklahoma State University and the Oklahoma City Public School System.


Omniplex (Oklahoma Science and Arts Foundation) and Kirkpatrick Planetarium will occupy the major portion of the Center. The Zoo, Zoological Society and *Indian America* Magazine will have their offices there. Future plans call for a Space Theater similar to the one in San Diego, the Oklahoma Aviation Hall of Fame, the Indian Heritage Center, restaurants and exhibits provided by business corporations.









Total of Individual Funds at end of year



Foundation Income Distributed


