#### "BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE"

## **1977 GRANTS 30% MORE THAN 1976 \$173,530 DISTRIBUTED TO 52 CHARITIES**

Checks totaling \$173,530 were delivered to 52 local charities the last week in January. This sum is an increase of \$39,480 over the previous year. Grants are made possible from the annual net income of 164 separate trust funds in the Community Foundation. In addition, the trustees authorized distribution of principal to four charities in accordance with requests made by the donors.

Beneficiaries were Kirkpatrick Center for construction costs, Dean A. McGee Eye Institute for glaucoma research, Oklahoma Zoological Society for completion of interior space at new location, Barkouras Foundatin for general program support.

The total amount of income and principal distributed by the Foundation to tax-exempt organizations in metropolitan Oklahoma City for 1977 was \$1,132,724.

Severe weather forced the cancellation of the annual dinner honoring the donors scheduled for Tuesday, January 17. Dr. Dolphus Whitten, President of Oklahoma City University, had agreed to preside. A party for Foundation donors will be held later in the spring at the new Kirkpatrick Center. Guests will enjoy a train ride through the Zoo, a tour of the new Science Center and a Planetarium show.

### **NEW FUNDS ESTABLISHED IN 1977**



### KIRKPATRICK CENTER OFFICIALLY OPENS Dignitaries Attend Dedication February 13

Within three years from the time the first gift was made to the Community Foundation, the dream became a reality. On February 13 Kirkpatrick Center was formally dedicated. Daniel M. McMaster, President of the Chicago Museum of Science and Industry, was the featured speaker. Sharing the honors were Governor David Boren and Mayor Patience Latting. Over 600 invited guests from across the nation braved the wintry weather to share the festivities.

Contruction of Kirkpatrick Center was funded by the Community Foundation over a period of three years from the John E. Kirkpatrick Family Fund. In that remarkedly short period of time the Foundation trustees guided the formation and development of this major regional educational/ recreational complex. It is governed by a board of directors composed of the Governor, Mayor, and



representatives of the major educational and cultural organizations of the state. The new Center will house OMNIPLEX (formerly Oklahoma Science and Arts Foundation), Kirkpatrick Planetarium, offices for the Oklahoma City Zoo and Oklahoma Zoological Society, the Indian American Heritage Institute, Oklahoma Aviation and Space Hall of Fame, Florence Wilson Natural History Library, the George Sutton collection of orinthology and the Sylvan N. Goldman Lecture Hall. Additional tenants are pending.

The 156,000 square foot structure is located in the northeast quandrant of the city adjacent to the Oklahoma City Zoo. Nearby are such major cultural facilities as the National Cowboy Hall of Fame, the Softball Hall of Fame, Lincoln Park, the American Field Trial Museum and the Capitol. Kirkpatrick Center is the newest among the most rapidly developing institutions of learning in contemporary society, providing a whole range of self-motivating experiences through exhibits which appeal to the senses and intellect. Kirkpatrick Center will assist a large segment of the public in gaining better understanding of technology's impact upon their lives.


# THE F. M. KNIGHT TRUST FOR HANDICAPPED CHILDREN

This trust was created by the will of Florida May Knight. Mrs. Knight bequeathed property which she owned at 314 Park Avenue in Oklahoma City, with provisions that the income from the property (after mortgage payments and other expenses) be used


"for the benefit of needy children living in Oklahoma City who are handicapped in their enjoyment of life because they are crippled, blind, spastic, mentally retarded, or suffering some other disability, with particular reference to those being treated at Oklahoma Children's Memorial Hospital. The money so available shall be used for the medical care, education and recreation of such children, including the giving of appropriate gifts to the younger children on their birthdays, with the objective of helping the children find happiness in life in spite of their handicaps."

Roger Swan, attorney for the Knight Estate, transferred the corpus of \$103,058.08 to the Community Foundation October 6, 1977. In January, 1978 the Foundation awarded its first grant of \$2,500 to the Pediatric Department of Oklahoma Children's Memorial Hospital in accordance with Mrs. Knight's desires.

Mrs. Knight was born near Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and started to work at an early age after her father was killed in a construction accident. She became secretary to the VicePresident (later President) of the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company. One summer he sent her to the company's office in Minneapolis where she could enjoy the recreational facilities available there. She met Joseph Arthur Knight, and they were married in 1907. In 1909 they moved to Oklahoma City where Mr. Knight worked as a salesman for the local branch of Pittsburgh Plate Glass. In 1910 a son Arthur was born. By 1919 the young family had saved enough money to purchase a building at 314 West First Street where they opened their own glass and paint business named United Plate and Window Glass Company. Five years later Mr. and Mrs. Knight were divorced, and Mrs. Knight took over the management of the business. By 1928 West First Street had become predominantly retail Mrs. Knight built a warehouse at 1218 West Main Street buildings. In 1931 she built a 17,500 square foot sales and service building at the northeast corner of California and Western Avenue.



### **The Allied Arts Foundation**



February is ALLIED ARTS month, the annual fund-raising effort to provide operating support for the city's six major cultural organizations. The Oklahoma City Ballet Society was added this year.

The Community Foundation has strongly supported the Allied Arts since it began in 1971. The joint drive decreases the number of general public fund drives and the expenses incurred; relieves the six agencies of the burden of fund-raising; acts as a watch dog to insure financial responsibility; and, has the backing of business and community leaders.

The ALLIED ARTS endowment fund is one of the most active, designated funds in the Community Foundatin, built from contributions made by Florence Wilson, Mrs. Clarence Roberts, Marion DeVore, John

Kilpatrick, Jr., Michael Thomas Family, Mary Miles Clanton, Earl Sneed, Mr. and Mrs. Clark Ritchie, Willard Scott, Jerry Morton, John E. Kirkpatrick, Ray Potts, and Fern and Boze Cooper. The fund totaled \$35,300 at the end of January.

Earnings from this sustaining fund are distributed annually to the ALLIED ARTS FOUNDATION. Each year the trustees have augmented the actual income with income from non-designated funds. Grants distributed by the Community Foundation to ALLIED ARTS are: 1971, \$1,000; 1972, \$5,000; 1973, \$5,000; 1974, \$5,000; 1975, \$5,000; 1976, \$5,000; 1977, \$7,000.

Remember that this endowment fund for the arts can be built by bequest or direct gift of cash, stocks, bonds, overriding royalty interests, real estate, life insurance or any other certificate of ownership.
