

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OVERVIEW, HAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation was created in 1969 to serve the philanthropic intent of those citizens with strong charitable and civic interests. In the past 17 years, 300 major donors have provided more than 120 educational and charitable organizations with endowment support. The Community Foundation today has a total asset value of \$21.4 million.

Community needs are dramatically affected by the economic environment. Oklahoma is experiencing a difficult period of economic transition, and community needs have become more acute. While the Foundation does not, of course, have the resources to solve all of these needs, it can provide significant assistance through the capable administration of funds to provide income and asset growth in a changing economy. The Foundation has honored the intent of its donors in the fields of social services, education, civic and cultural programs, medicine and science. We are grateful to those philanthropists whose generosity has enabled the Foundation to make these significant contributions to the growth and health of our community.

In reviewing the past year, we are pleased to report that total assets have grown to a total of \$21.4 million. Fourteen new name funds were established this year. Contributions for the year totalled \$1,015,000.

A total of \$1.3 million in grants was authorized by the Trustees in 1985. These grants are listed in the following pages, and several are discussed more specifically in the Director's Report. They indicate that the Foundation continues to put its resources, including the time and expertise of our Trustees, Fiscal Trustees, and staff, as well as our funds, behind important projects and activities.

As a convenience to donors and non-profit organizations, the Foundation has adjusted its fiscal year to end June 30 and begin July 1. The fiscal year based on the calendar year was not sufficiently responsive to donors' tax planning needs. This system also reflects more closely the budgetary year of most non-profit and charitable organizations with which we work. Because of this change, the Community Foundation will have a shortened fiscal reporting period effective January 1, 1986 through June 30, 1986. Distributions of earnings during this period will be made in September-October, 1986. The first full fiscal year under the new fiscal calendar will commence July 1, 1986. Grants will thereafter be made twice each year, in the fall and spring, while distributions of earnings will be made once annually, per current practices.

We are fortunate in the expertise and dedication of a hard-working Board of Trustees. Our Trustees are deeply involved in both the community and in the work of the Foundation. We are also pleased to announce that Nancy Anthony has become the Foundation's new Director. Her community service record is outstanding and her administrative expertise will benefit not only the Foundation, but those organizations which rely on our staff for counseling and technical assistance. Ms. Anthony replaces Dr. Robert Woolsey, whose invaluable services over the past three years have contributed significantly to the advancement of the Foundation. The Trustees join me in extending to Dr. Woolsey our sincere appreciation for his efforts and our acknowledgement of his contribution to our professional development.

One could not ask for a more capable or more dedicated group of colleagues. Together we are committed to the, challenge of our mission — to enhance the quality of life in Oklahoma City.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

There is no substitute for innovative ideas, good judgement, and bold leadership. Combined, they can manage and shape the social and economic future of our community. The Community Foundation provides a vehicle for bringing these elements together. Innovative ideas are generated by those in our community with a desire to take responsibility for their own lives as they address the challenges of the future. The Community Foundation has 17 years of practiced skill in managing and investing funds on behalf of numerous charitable organizations. Bold leadership comes from individuals with a strong interest in the community's welfare, supported by philanthropic action. Acting together, these community partners can focus attention and take meaningful steps towards enhancing the quality of life for all citizens.

Over the years, the Community Foundation has been a good steward of the deeply personal goals of our donors, providing experienced guidance in managing the funds entrusted to it for growth and continuity of purpose. It has been a convener, bringing together disparate parties to achieve a common good. It has been a catalyst, identifying issues, initiating action, and providing resources. It has been a responsive funder, encouraging constructive and imaginative proposals from diverse organizations in the community.

Perhaps the clearest measure of the Community Foundation's achievements and purpose is in the ventures it has undertaken on behalf of its many donors in partnership with charitable organizations of many different kinds, pursuing many different goals.

The OKLAHOMA CITY COMMUNITY FOOD BANK was begun approximately 5 years ago. It combined a special need with a special situation. Most foods are dated and must be sold during the effective period. Food distributors or manufacturers with dated foods that have not sold or are mislabeled in some way can either sell their products at a loss to a liquidator or donate them for tax write-offs. The Oklahoma City Community Food Bank was established to provide a vehicle for receiving donated foods and distributing them to agencies throughout the Oklahoma City area. Organized around concepts similar to the National Community Food Bank, the Oklahoma City Community Food Bank distributes food to any on-site food program operated by a charitable organization. It charges recipients a small handling fee.

The Community Foundation has been an active partner in the development of this organization almost from inception, with two grants to help fund initial operation costs. This year the Oklahoma City Food Bank received a third grant of \$10,000 to help with the acquisition of a larger warehouse facility.

Parents and supporters of the DEER CREEK PUBLIC SCHOOLS established an endowment at the Community Foundation in 1981. The board members worked hard to build the fund, taking advantage of matching funds available to them from John E. and Eleanor B. Kirkpatrick. In order to encourage new organizations to build for the future, the Kirkpatricks have often offered to match contributions to an organization's endowment fund.

The Deer Creek Community Enrichment Foundation now has an endowment fund of \$170,000. This year Deer Creek Public Schools received a special grant of \$13,333 to assist in funding a teleconferencing instruction program. The program enables the school to offer high school courses in a broad variety of topics without additional teaching staff required. The Community Foundation grant covered one-third of the cost of this program. One-third was provided by the school and one-third came from the Deer Creek Community Enrichment Foundation.

OMNIPLEX has an endowment which has grown to \$340,482 over the past 8 years. The consistent income from earnings this has generated has enabled Omniples to bring many exciting programs to the people of Oklahoma City. This year the Community Foundation will participate in a special funding effort with a grant of \$7,260 for purchasing equipment for weather education programs. The programs generate current weather maps and other sophisticated forecasting materials. This program has special significance in the light of recent announcements for the establishment of the National Weather Bureau in Norman, and a new industry in Oklahoma.

The Community Foundation has a long and varied history of assistance to the cultural arts. Many programs have been directed through the auspices of the ARTS COUNCIL OF OKLAHOMA CITY. This year a grant of \$5,000 will help fund the start-up costs of a program of arts for the handicapped. This year's program is Dance for the Deaf. Artists will work with schools in seminars and classes, teaching deaf children about the art of dance and helping them learn to feel dance with their other senses.

The RAINBOW FLEET is a

special organization for everyone at the Community Foundation, affecting as it does the life experiences of our most important natural resource, children. In its start-up year, the Community Foundation provided part of the funds to purchase vans. Oklahoma City University, Casady School, the Arts Council, and the Junior League have also been important supporters during this early time. In the second year, the Community Foundation supported the operation of the toy library. This year may prove to be the most exciting of all. A grant of \$5,000 will help fund visits by trained Montessori teachers to day care centers throughout the community. It is estimated that the program will affect the quality of day care experiences for approximately 50% of our children in day care centers.

The Community Foundation provided a first time grant of \$10,000 to the SOUTHEAST AREA HEALTH CENTER to provide essential structural improvements to its facility. The Southeast Area Health Center provides basic preventive health Center provides basic preventive health care to people who are excluded from other health care programs for a variety of reasons. It improves the quality of life for many, because it improves their general level of health, before major illnesses can develop.

CONTACT is a twenty-four hour phone counseling and referral service manned by trained volunteers. The volunteers spend 50 hours in training prior to active service. The Mayor's Hunger and Shelter Task Force identified a growing need for a services clearinghouse to exchange information between food and shelter service agencies as to the identity of persons served, what they received and when, in defense against organized rings operating within the system for profit. The Community Foundation responded with a grant of \$11,000 to Contact to establish this clearinghouse. As a neutral party, with a twenty-four hour phone service in operation, Contact was ideally suited to fulfill this role of information clearinghouse. Each agency may make its own decision about distribution of service, but may now do so on an informed basis.

These are but a few examples of the ways in which the Community Foundation has worked effectively with charitable organizations in a joint venture approach to improving the quality of life in our community. Active in the areas of education. cultural arts, health, social services, and a variety of youth programs, the Community Foundation is pleased to respond to the commitments of the donors to improve the quality, the impact, and the potential of the future for Oklahoma City. The Community Foundation will continue to work actively to bring together donors and organizations to respond to community needs and to endow the future of Oklahoma City.

INVESTMENT STATEMENT

The portfolio of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation is invested by the five Fiscal Trustee banks. Each bank makes independent investment decisions within the investment guidelines set forth by the Community Foundation Trustees. The basic investment objectives include protecting the contributed capital against inflation, preserving the capital against loss, and providing a continued source of income.

Accordingly, the aggregate investments are quite diversified. As of December 31, 1985 the market value of the portfolio was \$22,253,094. Approximately 7% was invested in cash equivalent holdings, 37.6% in U.S. Government obligations, 4.8% in bonds, and 50.6% in common and preferred stocks. Additionally, the Community Foundation holds real estate and mineral interests valued at \$1.0 million. For the fiscal year ending December 31, 1985 the overall performance of these assets was 19.83% including appreciation and total return. The cash return on contributed capital was 7.3%, and all cash income was distributed. Administrative and trust expenses were less than 1% of total assets.

The Community Foundation is able to provide professional investment management at a very low cost to all donors and participating non-profit organizations. The Fiscal Bank Trustees are pleased to work with the Community Foundation in providing this service to Oklahoma City.

DISTRIBUTION STATEMENT

The Trustees of the Community Foundation serve as the Distribution Committee. This year they were assisted by a Grants Review Committee, which read all of the applications, researched the requests, and made site visits to many of the organizations. Special appreciation is expressed to Mr. Ray T. Anthony, Dr. Clayton Rich, Mrs. Edward Soule, and Mrs. Marilyn Myers, who assisted in this preliminary review work.

Total cash earnings of \$1,311,817 were distributed to charitable organizations this year. Earnings on the more than 120 Designated Funds accounted for \$867,519. These earnings were awarded based on 9.0% of the average monthly balance in the fund. These Designated Fund earnings provide a significant source of annual contributions for many non-profit organizations in the Oklahoma City area.

Grants from the General Fund earnings and other Area-of-Interest Funds totalled \$434,298. The Trustees made 45 special grants to community organizations to address special needs of the Oklahoma City area.

Grants from the Donor-Advised Funds were coordinated with grants made by the Trustees from the undesignated earnings. This was done to provide donors with information about needs in the community and to allow them to participate in many of the larger grants.

Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. As described in Note B, in previous years the Foundation prepared its financial statements using generally accepted accounting principles. The 1984 financial statements presented in comparative form with the 1985 financial statements have been restated to conform with the new basis of accounting.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the assets, liabilities and fund balance arising from cash transactions of Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. at December 31, 1985 and 1984, and the results of its activities and the changes in its cash balances for the years then ended on the basis of accounting described in Note A, applied on a consistent basis, after considering the restatement discussed in the preceding paragraph.

OKLAHOMA CITY COMMUNITY FOUNDATION, INC. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 1985

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. was incorporated December 30, 1968 under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, as a non-profit organization without capital stock for charitable and educational purposes pertaining to the community of greater Oklahoma City.

NOTE A — SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: During 1985 the Association adopted a policy of preparing its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. The principal differences between this basis and generally accepted accounting principles are due to the methods used to account for donations receivable, accrued interest and dividends, accounts payable and accrued expenses, and distributions payable. This new basis is used for all instances except for bequests receivable, which are recorded at their present value at the date of bequest, and purchased interest, which is included as an asset until the income is actually received.

Donations: Certain donations made to the Foundation have been designated for a particular purpose by the donors. It is the expressed intention of the Foundation to honor the designations of donors; however, the Foundation reserves the power to exercise final control over all funds.

Investments: Securities and other investments are maintained by five trustee banks in various trust funds and are valued at the lower of cost or market. The cost of donated investments is the fair market value at the date of receipt. Property and Equipment: Property and equipment is stated at cost. The cost of donated property and equipment is its fair market value at the date of gift. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The estimated useful lives are five years for furniture and fixtures and twenty years for buildings. Producing oil and gas properties are amortized based on production and are net of accumulated depletion of \$444,194 for 1985 and \$366,748 for 1984. Non-producing oil and gas interest are not amortized until such time they become producing.

NOTE B — CHANGE IN BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

In previous years, the Foundation prepared its financial statements using generally accepted accounting principles. In 1985, the Foundation adopted the cash receipts and disbursements method of accounting as the basis for its financial statements. The 1984 financial statements presented in comparative form with the 1985 financial statements have been restated to conform with the new basis of accounting. As a result of the differences described in Note A between the cash receipts and disbursements method and generally accepted accounting principles, the fund balance at the beginning of 1984 is approximately \$1,610,000 higher, excess (deficiency) of revenues over expenses, distributions, depreciation, and depletion for 1984 is approximately \$315,000 higher, and the fund balance at the end of 1984 is approximately \$1,925,000 higher, than the amounts previously reported.

NOTE C — INVESTMENTS

The Foundation owns 100% of the stock of an oil and gas producing corporation. The investment is being accounted for on the equity method. The carrying value, which is increased by the income earned by the corporation and decreased by the distributions received, was \$265,000 and \$236,000 at December 31, 1985 and 1984, respectively.

NOTE D — DISTRIBUTIONS

The Foundation normally makes the majority of its distributions during the first quarter of each year. Since the Foundation's year end is December 31 and the financial statements are prepared using the cash receipts and disbursements method of accounting, the amounts shown as distributions in 1985 and 1984 do not include the amounts distributed during the first quarter of 1986 and 1985, respectively. Rather, these distributions are reflected in the year actually paid. Distributions made during these periods were approximately \$1,300,000 and \$2,100,000, respectively.

NOTE E - LONG-TERM DEBT

During 1985, the Foundation received a donation of land and a building with a total estimated fair market value of \$225,000. As a requirement of the donation, the Foundation assumed an existing long-term obligation of \$10,500. The long-term obligation is payable in equal annual installments of \$1,400 until the final payment in 1993. In addition, interest payments equal to 9.5% of the outstanding principal balance are due semi-annually.

NOTE F — CONTRIBUTED SERVICES

Several of the Foundation's trustees provide contributions in the form of services performed at no cost. The value of the services is not reflected in these statements since it is not susceptible to objective measurement or valuation.

NOTE G - INCOME TAXES

The Internal Revenue Service has ruled that the Foundation qualifies under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is, therefore, not subject to tax under present income tax laws.

NAME FUNDS

A Name Fund is a donor-identified fund at The Community Foundation that represents total gifts of \$5,000 or more. The Beneficiary Agencies listed have been designated by the donors to receive the earnings from their Name Fund contributions.




