In 1992, total grant and endowment distributions of \$2,680,000 reflected an increase in the asset base of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, as well as an excellent return on investments. New channels were opened to the community through two new affiliated funds, new name funds and designated endowment funds. The Margaret Annis Boys Trust has begun to bear fruit through grants that have been made for city beautification projects.


In the course of the growth and activity of 1992 as well as in preceding years, it seemed that certain practices and policies had evolved that needed to be set forth in a strategic plan. The responsibilities of the Foundation's nineperson governing board are a hybrid of fiduciary and community leadership roles. Continuity of policies and consistency of purpose is a challenge for any nonprofit organization which depends on a rotating community leadership structure.

SUPPORT

The Foundation's mission is based on the purposes set forth in its organizing documents and amplified by current operations: to serve the charitable needs of the Oklahoma City area through the development and administration of permanent funds, with the goal of preserving capital and enhancing its long term value.

The Foundation will pursue this mission by educating and advocating for the development of permanent endowments to support non-profit organizations. It will provide convenient and effective ways for donors to contribute their assets. It will manage these endowments in a way that emphasizes long term asset growth over short-term income. By developing the general endowment Fund for Oklahoma City, the trustees of the Community Foundation can continue to develop and enhance services which meet the changing needs of the community.

Above all, the Community Foundation belongs to those it serves, both donors who want a way to help and those who need help. And so, in looking back over this year we look forward.



The total permanent fund contributions to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation through June 30, 1992 were \$53.8 million. The market value of the assets was \$73 million demonstrating an increasing value provided by investment performance.

To celebrate the 100th anniversary of B.C. Clark Jewelers, members of the B.C. Clark family have established a donor-advised fund whose earnings will be distributed annually by Clark family members and several selected employees.

In 1892 young B.C. Clark, freshly trained in watchmaking by his brother, came to Purcell, Indian Territory, and set up his own watchmaker's bench in a corner of the five and dime. He hung a sign in front of the store that read, "B.C. Clark, The Big Watch Jeweler." It was three feet in diameter and cost him about as much as all the capital he had invested in the store, but he said he wanted everyone to know he was in business.

NING CAPITAL

Most of Clark's first customers were railroad men who depended on him to keep their watches repaired and running precisely. Clark must have repaired them well because the business thrived; but by 1929, Purcell's population had stabilized and Oklahoma City was growing. It was time to move, even though Clark was 60 years old then. The Depression and the Dust Bowl followed, but the business survived.

Today there are four B.C. Clark stores, built on the founder's original philosophy of honesty, hard work, and customer service. He worked the floor until his death at age 94, and today his son and grandson still spend a majority of time with customers. "We are pioneer Oklahomans; our roots are here," said B.C. Clark, Jr. "Oklahoma City has been good to us in business, and we think the Oklahoma City Community Foundation is an ideal avenue to do something for a number of charities."

Edwin Malzahn is a quiet philanthropist from Perry, Oklahoma who grew up around the blacksmith, welding, and machine shop operated by his father and established in 1902 by his grandfather. With his father, he began to develop the Ditch Witch trenching machine in 1949. Today, Ditch Witch equipment is used all over the world; headquarters are still in Perry. The affiliated fund that Edwin Malzahn and his wife Mary have established with the Oklahoma City Community Foundation will help them continue their support for needs in their own home town. Preserving charitable capital in the state to improve the quality of life in one community ultimately benefits all of Oklahoma's communities.

Two Oklahoma foundations have preserved some of their assets by transferring them to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation.

After making significant grants to various Oklahoma universities, trustees for The Clarence Page Foundation decided to discontinue the foundation's grant-making function and transfer remaining assets of real estate, oil and gas interests to the affiliated fund for the Oklahoma Air Space Museum. Clarence Page was the Oklahoma aviation pioneer who established that Museum.

The E. Phil and Roberta Kirschner Trust is one of five trusts that were established by the estate of E.P. Kirschner, an oil man from Muskogee who was known as an influence for good in many arenas. One of Kirschner's wishes was to help orphans with no stable family or home. The trust set up at the Community Foundation will benefit Citizens Concerned for Children, an organization that helps foster children receive education and training past high school.





"Nebraska was a must," said Cooper's mother, Barbara. "Jerry loved the stability and sound of the OU band. He couldn't understand why so many people leave their seats at half time." Cooper had always loved music, and realized a high school dream when he earned a place playing baritone in the OU band. "I can still see him marching at the OU-Texas game; his smile lit up the field," said Barbara.

Cooper graduated with a degree in journalism and worked for the Muskogee Daily Phoenix before moving to New York City to make his way as a free-lance writer. He had been with Interior Design for four years when he died. A tribute written in the magazine after his death described him as a crackerjack editor, a sensitive and forwardthinking person.

At Jerry's request, his parents Jackie and Barbara Cooper set up a name fund at the Community Foundation that provides a scholarship for an OU band member. "He wanted others to have the kind of positive experience he had," his mother said.



Three years before statehood, some Oklahoma City businessmen organized the "Iron Cross Club," with membership made of representatives of different businesses or professions. A few years later, the group was recognized by the International Rotary Club and chartered as Club 29. Since then, Club 29, or Downtown Rotary, has grown to 370 members and contributed over \$800,000 to its annual Christmas projects, which range in diversity from a new entrance to the Zoo to armored vests for policemen.

During the 1950's, Club 29 also started its own foundation, which has grown to nearly \$75,000. With a goal of preserving and augmenting this principal with sound professional management, this year Club 29 transferred a portion of its foundation to the Community Foundation as a donor-advised fund that will help fund future projects.



The Belle Isle Neighborhood received one of the first grants awarded by the Margaret Annis Boys Trust, established at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation for the beautification of Oklahoma City. When the Boys Trust was announced, the Belle Isle Neighborhood Association was already working on its project to beautify the entrance at North Western and Lombardy, with money in the bank and permits for a landscaping plan. The Association applied for a grant for the landscaping and used its existing funds to set up a trust at the Community Foundation that will generate future income for maintenance.

Crowe & Dunlevy was one of the first law offices in Oklahoma Territory, founded by a Swedish immigrant named Charles Edward "Ole" Johnson. After graduating from the University of Texas, Johnson practiced law for a year in Houston. In 1902 he received his Oklahoma license and came to Oklahoma City, a community of 10,000 that was on the verge of rapid expansion. Johnson has been described in modern terms as a "rainmaker" who was active in Oklahoma City business circles, outgoing

and well-liked. Civic involvement would continue to be a hallmark of the firm. Today, Crowe & Dunlevy is the largest law firm in the state, employing 94 lawyers with offices in Oklahoma City, Tulsa and Norman. To celebrate its 90 years of service, Crowe & Dunlevy has helped sponsor an exhibit called, "Impressions of Oklahoma Pre-History: Painted Interpretations of Oklahoma Landscapes." The firm has also placed a ninetieth anniversary endowment gift with the Community Foundation that will help to continue its support for charitable causes in Oklahoma City.

Allie Reynolds has pitched for the New York Yankees and nur his own independent oil business. He received the Outstanding Indian Award at the American Indian Exposition in Anadarko in 1954, the same year he left professional baseball. Now he serves as president of the board of directors at the Center of the American Indian, which will receive endowment earnings from a name fund he established.


The son of a father who was three-quarters Creek and a mother whose ancestors were Northern European, Reynolds was not raised in the traditional Indian manner. He still remembers being "half scared" as a youngster when he met some braided relatives who looked more Indian than he did.

Reynolds went to college on a track scholarship and started playing baseball after injuring his knee playing football. He and his wife were married while he was in college, lean years when he made the honor roll but barely had the money to buy books. After graduating, Reynolds was drafted by the New York Giants but chose baseball because the pay was better. He enjoyed the game, but didn't enjoy living in the cities back east; neither did his family. When he played for the Yankees and lived in the Bronx, his wife and children moved back to Oklahoma and waited for him to come home.

A back injury ended baseball for Reynolds, but being a former ball player was an entree to a new career. He landed a job as general manager for Atlas Mud Company, subsequently bought and ran it for 26 years. "In baseball, every holiday we played a double header. When you're in business for yourself there aren't many holidays either," he said. "I thought you could do most anything if you worked at it."

Nearly forty years have passed since Reynolds pitched for the Yankees, and over ten since he sold his business. "I'm pleased with what I did in baseball but I think I've done other things as well," he said. One of the things Reynolds admires about his Native American ancestors is their ability to make it anywhere, even in hostile environments that were not of their choosing. One suspects that Reynolds and they have a great deal in common. "To encourage donors to create funds which will benefit the community both now and in the future."

Sometimes donors will establish an endowment fund that is named for an individual whose achievements have enhanced the fund's purpose. Such is the case for Dr. Bertha Levy and Marie Welch.

In 1941, Dr. Bertha Levy took on two new jobs; she opened her private pediatric practice in Oklahoma City and began volunteering her services at the Variety Health Center. Today, she is retired from practicing medicine but continues her association as a board member with Variety, which provides maternal and child health services to low-income families. When Variety raised funds this year to convert a donated office building to a new clinic, an endowment fund was established at the Community Foundation and named for Dr. Levy. Dr. Levy said that growing up during the Depression left her with the desire to help people who need it. Today, many people still can't afford to go to a private physician, but they can receive care at clinics like Variety Health Center from people who share Dr. Levy's dedication.

The Marie Welch Scholarship Fund will provide financial assistance to college students who have chosen insurance as their major field of study. It was established by the Professional Independent Insurance Agents of Oklahoma (PIIAO) to honor Marie Welch, a retired insurance executive. The PIIAO will select scholarship recipients.


Welch became President of the Oklahoma General Agency when her husband died at age 44. She was the first female president of the American Association of Managing General Agents and was active in every aspect of the business. A letter announcing the establishment of the fund states, "For 35 years Marie made Oklahoma General Agency a positive force in the property and casualty industry. During these years, she brought great personal integrity, friendship and financial assistance to agents all across Oklahoma." This scholarship fund will provide permanent recognition for the many contributions Welch made to her profession.

Being knowledgeable about the current crop of beautiful young women in town is the legitimate duty of any self-respecting bachelor. In the course of 46 Christmas Balls, the Bachelors Club of Oklahoma City has done just that, by presenting over 1,000 debutantes.

Less visible than the ceremony surrounding the annual Christmas Ball is the fact that The Bachelors Club has also raised considerable sums for charity; in the past decade, over \$110,000.

This year, the Bachelors Club set up a \$50,000 donor-advised fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. A donor-advised fund allows donors to annually advise the Foundation as to how they wish the earnings from their fund to be spent.

G. Scaling "Buddy" Corbyn was present at the beginning of the Bachelors Club in 1938. He and a group of friends were at the Mitla Beer Parlor on East 23rd Street, next to Deloris' Restaurant. Some of the girls already belonged to the French Heels, and the boys decided it was time to start their own club. The Club was inactive from 1941 to 45 because many of its members went into the service. The first Christmas Ball was held in 1946.



ADVOCATING FOR The Ambassadors' Choir began as a chorus of 42 voices singling Handlet SOUNDENTS Messiah, light classic, spiritual and gospel selections in December 1979. The

Messiah, light classic, spiritual and gospel selections in December 1979. The group was organized by Kenneth Kilgore as part of the Music Department of St. John Missionary Baptist Church, to present choral classics and encourage the musical development of its members. The choir now numbers 100; singing ability and availability for rehearsals are the main qualifications for membership.

The choir gives three major performances each year and makes a few smaller appearances. They have performed with the Oklahoma Symphony Orchestra, toured the state on a program sponsored by the State Arts Council, and received international recognition after performing with the Mineria Symphony Orchestra in Mexico City.

The fund designated for the Ambassadors' Choir was created with a matching grant from the Kirkpatrick Foundation. Earnings will support the purchase and orchestration of music.

Free to Live is an animal sanctuary for stray or mistreated animals located on 20 acres of land in North Edmond. The idea for this operation began in 1982, when founder Bill Larson sold his business and began looking for a charity to support. He and his wife Pat purchased land and provided seed money for the sanctuary after learning that only one in six dogs, and one in seven cats, have homes.

It is always full, Larson said. Free to Live takes in about 400 animals a year, most of which are adopted. The fund established at the Community Foundation will be used for further construction and operating expenses at Free to Live.



Tinker Air Force Base is the new site for Navy's two E6-A Squadrons, currently based in Hawaii and Maryland. E6-A aircraft are the communications link between the White House and deployed ballistic missile submarines. Transmissions are made by deploying an approximately five mile long antenna from the plane when it is airborne. Oklahoma City was chosen because of its central location geographically and because the E6-A aircraft are similar to the AWACS aircraft that are already based and maintained at Tinker. To support this mission, new construction amounting to \$80 million has been undertaken.

The relocation, to be completed by April 1993, will consist of 1,200 active duty personnel, including 500-600 families. To provide an Oklahoma welcome, a fund has been established at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation to benefit the younger enlisted men who are with the E6-A squadron. It will provide an honor award for outstanding service; scholarships for dependents; and emergency funds for special situations at the discretion of the commanding officer.

An endowment fund designated for a specific nonprofit organization can provide a vehicle that attracts additional contributions as well as providing steady, long-term support. This year, thirteen new designated funds were established at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. In some cases, the source of the funds was the non-profit organization itself; in others, it was a group of supporters. In the case of the Friends of the Metropolitan Library System of Oklahoma County, a distribution from the William T. Payne Fund was redirected back to the Community Foundation to establish a designated fund that will support the purchase of new books.







MEETING CHANGING



"You ve got to have a passion about this," snid Betty Bruce, looking out the window of her office on The Paseo. With the first three years of planning and fund raising behind, Positively Paseo! has entered its second phase, that of producing tangible accomplishments.

With a grant from the Community Foundation, Bruce has been hired to coordinate the efforts of local groups and carry out the strategies that she and other volunteers spent thousands of hours working out with the City Planning staff. What is good for the artists in the area is considered essential to its economic revitalization. Quality housing must be available and affordable. "We have good guidelines in place now," Bruce said. "Ordinances that uphold the quality of renovations will help eliminate 'fly-by-nighters.' If you do it well, it lasts."

In the late 1920's, The Paseo was a two-block suburban shopping district that served a fashionable clientele who lived in the neighborhood. Built by developer Dr. G.A. (Doc) Nichols, The Paseo was the first shopping center outside of downtown Oklahoma City. Over the years, the stability of The Paseo's neighborhood ebbed and flowed with the economy of the city, and in the 1980's the drastic downturn of the oil industry had such an adverse effect that many surrounding stable neighborhoods began to be affected by what was happening in The Paseo. It was designated a pilot revitalization project by the City Council in late 1987, with the idea that if such a project were successful it could be duplicated in other areas. Perhaps rebirth can be a stronger force than blight.

For a person who can not do basic math, read or speak English, normal avenues to a new job through vocational training are closed. It is estimated that there are 130,000 adult illiterates in Oklahoma County. In Oklahoma City, nearly one in five residents is illiterate. The foundation of a qualified work force is basic literacy; that is the goal of the Community Literacy Center. Instruction includes professional, paid tutors assisted by trained volunteers, and both print and computer-assisted instruction. This year, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation awarded a two-year New Initiative Grant to support the operation of an additional Literacy Center in south Oklahoma City.

Healing Hands annually provides health care and counseling to over 1,400 homeless adults and children who do not qualify for state or federal health care services because they have no permanent address. Medications for conditions such as respiratory and ear infections, diabetes and hypertension are available from Healing Hands, as well as HIV/AIDS counseling, Substance Abuse assessment and case management. Most of the staff at Healing Hands are volunteers.

Healing Hands relys on grants and contributions for financial support. A grant from the Community Foundation enabled this organization to purchase a much needed new clinic in a safer and more accessible location.

The Mayfair Center is a cooperative model for community service to the elderly and their caregivers, located in the former Mayfair Elementary School. The Fund for Oklahoma City was one of the local funding sources for renovation of this building in January 1988, and has since provided funds for other grants as well. This year, the Community Foundation awarded a grant for a parking lot addition which would include handicapped parking adaptations.

For the well elderly, the congregate meals program provides nutrition and friendships; other community room activities permit enjoyable and educational participation. The Daily Living Center offers an adult day health center which enriches the lives of very frail participants and frees family caregivers, many of whom work outside the home. Eldercare coordinates services for those elderly who need a combination of services in order to remain in their homes. Hospice cares for the terminally ill in their own homes. Areawide Aging and Senior Information Services facilitate services in four counties. Volunteers are enriched by their participation in these activities.

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation provides support for eight organizations called affiliated funds. Each fund has its own board of trustees and is separately incorporated as a 509 (a)(3) non-profit organization. The Community Foundation appoints a majority of the board of each affiliated fund and provides all management and investment services. The trustees of each fund make the decisions about earnings distributions and provide direction for investment of the fund's assets. Affiliated funds provide customized management for the assets of a charitable foundation and the endowment funds of nonprofit organizations.

Two new affiliated funds were established during this fiscal year: the Malzahn Family Affiliated Fund and the Oklahoma City Art Museum Affiliated Fund.

THE OKLAHOMA CITY ART MUSEUM AFFILIATED FUND

In 1991 the endowment that was designated for the Oklahoma City Art Museum was reestablished at the Community Foundation as an affiliated fund. A new director is continuing the unification of OCAM's three unique locations that began four years ago. Downtown, Arts Place showcases the works of regional and local artists in a retail setting. OCAM at the Fairgrounds houses the permanent collection and hosts a variety of exhibits and events. The Mansion is an elegant setting for programs, corporate luncheons, fundraisers and meetings. Together, these locations provide balance and quality for this fine arts institution.



This fund was established in 1991. Edwin Malzahn is a Perry native who began to develop the Ditch Witch trenching machine with his father in 1949. Today, Ditch Witch equipment is used all over the world; headquarters are still in Perry. The affiliated fund that Malzahn and his wife Mary have established will help them continue their support for needs in their own home town. Preserving charitable capital in the state to improve the quality of life in one community ultimately benefits all of Oklahoma's communities. (Picture on page 4.)

This year, endowment support from this fund to Omniplex will exceed \$80,000. Market value, \$1,779,212. Trustees: Michael Stewart, Don Balaban, Ray T. Anthony, John Frank, and Robert Rose.

WILLIAM E. AND MARGARET H. DAVIS FAMILY FUND

Founded in 1986 by the children of William E. and Margaret H. Davis, the Davis Family Fund provides support to a wide range of charitable organizations Mr. and Mrs. Davis founded a food distribution company which became one of the largest providers of institutional foods in the Southwest. More than ninety percent of the grants are made to Oklahoma-based organizations. Since 1986, total grants have exceeded \$316,000.

OKLAHOMA AIR SPACE MUSEUM AFFILIATED FUND

Founded in 1990, the Oklahoma Air Space Museum Affiliated Fund was started with major gifts from John and Eleanor Kirkpatrick and the Clarence E. Page Foundation. Mr. Page, an earlyday Oklahoma aviator, founded the museum which houses his own extensive collection of aircraft and aviation memorabilia. The annual support to the museum exceeds \$100,000 and is a significant part of the operating income. Market value, \$2,504,321.

COWBOY HALL OF FAME AFFILIATED FUND

Founded in 1990, the Cowboy Hall of Fame Affiliated Fund was formed with the assets of a former Designated Fund which benefitted the National Cowboy Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center. This fund is a major component of the long-term endowment plan for the museum.

Market value, \$759,196.

It has continued the Kirkpatrick Family tradition of support for arts and cultural facilities. A grant of \$70,00 was made to City Arts in 1992. Market value, \$2,650,100.

Founded in 1988, the Kirkpatrick Center Affiliated Fund holds the endowment assets of the Kirkpatrick Center, a museum complex housing Omniplex, Oklahoma Air Space Museum, Center of the American Indian, International Photography Hall of Fame and other galleries. Support from this fund to Kirkpatrick Center will be more than \$1 million in 1992. Market value, \$21,598.826.

Trustees: George Records, Don Balaban, John E. Kirkpatrick, James R. Tolbert, III, and Eleanor Maurer.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1992 the Oklahoma City Community Foundation distributed \$2.8 million of endowment earnings to support community organizations and activities. These grants were made through four separate programs:

Designated Fund earnings are those from contributions which have been specifically designated to benefit individual charitable organizations. In addition to these cash distributions, the agencies also received an allocation from realized investment gains.

Donor-Advised grants are made from name funds when the donor advises the Trustees of the Community Foundation as to which organizations should receive contributions from that donor's name fund.

Trustee grants are recommended by the Grants Committee of the Trustees of the Community Foundation. Earnings supporting these grants come from the Fund for Oklahoma City and other funds that have been established for specific areas of interest.

Grants from the eight affiliated funds at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation are made by the Trustees of those funds and administered by the Community Foundation.

Serving the charitable needs of the Oklahoma City area requires that the Oklahoma City Community Foundation provide both efficient administration of charitable funds and effective methods of investment which maximize the resources available to support the needs of the community. By keeping its cost of administration low, the Community Foundation provides a valuable service for both donors and agencies which encourages increased contributions and the growth of permanent funds.

In the fiscal year ending June 30, 1992, the total cost of operation was 0.71 percent of market value, well below the national average for community foundations of 1.50 percent.

Investment performance for the pooled resources of the Community Foundation has added significant value to the individual funds at the Foundation. One of the greatest advantages of the Community Foundation for an individual donor or organization with an endowment fund is the ability to benefit from the professional investment services which the Community Foundation employs and to share in the diversity of both management styles and investment vehicles which a large endowment fund can provide. During the past fiscal year, the total return on the pooled funds of the Community Foundation was 10.29 percent. Designated Fund organizations received a 5.8 percent cash distribution and additional appreciation of 5.44 percent added to the value of the fund giving a total return of 11.24 percent. A 91-day Treasury Bill returned about 4.42 percent during the year.

Investment performance is viewed in the long-term by the Investment Committee. The average annual return on all Community Foundation funds for the period 1987-1992 was 9.56 percent. This five-year performance compares favorably to both market indices and the performance of other funds.

All investment management services at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation are provided by Bank of Oklahoma, Boatmen's Bank, Liberty Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma. James Hotchkiss, investment counsel, meets regularly with the investment managers and the Investment Committee to monitor the performance. While the investment performance cannot be guaranteed, donors and non-profit organizations can be assured that the Community Foundation gives full attention to achieving the best long-term investment results for its funds.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OKLAHOMA CITY COMMUNITY FOUNDATION, INC.

June 30, 1992

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation") was incorporated December 30, 1968 under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, as a nonprofit organization without capital stock for charitable and educational purposes pertaining to the community of greater Oklahoma City.

NOTE A - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The Foundation prepares its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. The principal differences between this basis and generally accepted accounting principles are due to the methods used to account for donations receivable, accrued interest and dividends, accounts payable and accrued expenses, and distributions payable. The cash basis is used for all instances except purchased interest, which is included as an asset until the income is actually received.

The accompanying financial statements include the assets, liabilities, fund balance and activities of the Foundation and its eight affiliated organizations:

The affiliated funds are combined with the Foundation in the accompanying financial statements because the Foundation effectively controls the Funds' Board of Trustees and distributions made by the Funds exclusively benefit the charitable and educational purposes of the Foundation.

Donations: Certain donations made to the Foundation have been designated for a particular purpose by the donors. It is the expressed intention of the Foundation to honor the designations of donors; however, the Foundation reserves the power to exercise final control over all funds.

It is the intent of the Foundation to distribute all escrowed donations received. Thus, these donations will not become a part of the permanent fund balance.

Investments: Securities and other investments are maintained by local trustee banks in various trust funds and are valued at the lower of aggregate cost or market. The cost basis of donated investments is the fair market value at the date of receipt. Cash equivalent funds are comprised of short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash.

Property and Equipment: Property and equipment is stated at cost. The basis of donated property and equipment is its fair market value at the date of receipt. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The estimated useful lives are five years for furniture and fixtures and twenty years for buildings.

<u>Qil and Gas Properties</u>: Producing oil and gas properties are amortized based on production and are net of accumulated depletion of \$505,371 and \$485,194 at June 30, 1992 and 1991, respectively. Non-producing oil and gas interests are not amortized until such time as they become producing.

NOTE C - CONTRIBUTED SERVICES

Several of the Foundation's trustees provide contributions in the form of services performed at no cost. The value of the services is not reflected in these statements since it is not susceptible to objective measurement or valuation.

NOTE D - INCOME TAXES

The Internal Revenue Service has ruled that the Foundation qualifies under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is, therefore, not subject to tax under present income tax laws.

NOTE E - RETIREMENT PLAN

Effective July 1, 1991, substantially all employees of the Foundation began participation in the Retirement Plan of Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc., commonly known as a Section 403(b) annuity plan. Under the plan, the Foundation contributes amounts not to exceed 7% of the respective employee's regular salary to provide retirement benefits. In addition, the employees may contribute up to 20% of their regular salary to the plan. Contributions are subject to Internal Revenue Service limitations. Contributions made by the Foundation are 100% vested after 7 years of service. Benefits paid under the plan are limited to the sum of the employee's and the Foundation's contributions and investment earnings on those contributions. The Foundation contributed \$7,465 to the plan during the year ended June 30, 1992.

The Board of Trustees and staff of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation administer endowment funds that have supported charitable causes in central Oklahoma since 1969. An endowment fund provides annual income through investment earnings.

The Community Foundation owes its beginning to founder John Kirkpatrick and other Oklahoma City citizens who recognized the need for a steady and permanent source of income for non-profit agencies. To realize this goal, they created an entity patterned after the most successful community foundations in the nation. In the words of its first annual report, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation was "designed to meet the test of time."

A nine-member Board of Trustees representing a broad range of groups in the community oversees the distribution of endowment earnings. Officers from four local banks comprise the Fiscal Committee, which manages the Foundation's assets. This division of responsibility between board and fiscal trustees is one of the key underpinnings of the Community Foundation's structure.

Today, with permanent assets of \$73 million, we are the 25th largest of 300 community foundations in the United States, providing ongoing financial support to more than 200 charitable organizations.

Establishing a Fund


The Oklahoma City Community Foundation would not exist without donors. Assets, once contributed, must become a permanent part of its endowment. However, the Community Foundation is firmly committed to recognizing and preserving the original charitable intentions of all donors.

At the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, small donor contributions receive the same investment return, for the same minimal administrative cost, as large donor contributions. While donations of all sizes are welcome, a donor fund is established when total contributions reach \$1,000. A name fund is created when total contributions reach \$5,000.

Donations can be made by an individual or a group. They may be made in many forms – cash, marketable securities, life insurance, oil and gas royalties, real estate, and life income trusts.

Donors may choose to advise the Community Foundation on how they wish the earnings from their donations to be distributed or they may wish to contribute to the Fund for Oklahoma City, an undesignated fund that enables the Trustees to respond to changing needs in the community.
