Kirkpatricks Offer Challenge Money;

Deadline Set for December 10

rom now until December 10, money raised for designated endowment funds valued at less than \$50,000 will be matched by John and Eleanor Kirkpatrick. Over 100 non-profit organizations are eligible to participate in this year's challenge.

If the challenge is successful, the total amount added to Designated Funds will be at least \$2 million. That would increase the value of this group of endowment funds by more than 40 per cent, and increase annual earnings available to these agencies from \$130,000 to \$230,000 every year.

This year's challenge celebrates the Oklahoma City Community Foundation's 25th year. It is the third time in the Foundation's history that such an offer has been made. The first, in 1979, launched the Designated Endowment Fund program which now includes over 200 organizations and \$18 million in endowment assets.

Last year, the second challenge was met with enthusiasm and broad based support. Sixty-five of the seventy-four eligible non-profits participated in the challenge. They raised a total of \$341,380 with 750 contributions.



Designated Funds help non-profit organizations attract and manage endowment fund support for a steady yearly source of income. A major goal of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation is to encourage the development of these funds. For this year's challenge, donor cards and brochures explaining designated endowment funds are available.

This year, the goal and amount of match money depends on the current value of the Designated Fund. Inside this newsletter is a list of eligible organizations and amount of match available.

The goal for funds below \$10,000 is \$25,000; for funds over \$10,000 and less than \$20,000, the goal is \$35,000. Funds valued from \$20,000 to \$25,000 are challenged to get to \$45,000, and funds over

\$25,000 are challenged to get to \$50,000. The maximum challenge money available to any one fund is \$12,500. Organizations whose endowments are \$45,000 or over still can receive challenge money up to \$5,000.

Last year, Saint James School included the Kirkpatrick Challenge in its annual giving campaign letter. Although the giving period usually ends in May, most donations were paid by December 1 to help the school meet the challenge. With the help of its preschool committee, the Erna Krouch preschool did its

first solicitation ever, sending out a mailing to 600 and receiving 84 responses. Original donors when the fund was established in 1980 reappeared through their donations, and others gave who had never given before.

Other non-profits mobilized in other ways. The Referral Center held a sell-out, non-alcoholic beverage evening at Jokers. David Sapper, President of the Belle Isle Neighborhood. Association, canvassed his neighborhood. "Anytime someone would say he could only give \$25, I told him it was like giving

\$50," Sapper said. "Our endowment fund will enable us to maintain our project and the whole western front of the neighborhood."

Linda Bonebrake, mother of three Kerr-McGee swimmers, said she wrote a "passionate" letter to other swimmers' parents, pointing out that if everyone gave \$30 the club would be eligible for the total challenge grant. The response was better than ever before, she said

This year's challenge is unprecedented, not only in this community but among community foundations across the country.

New Tax Rule Boosts Incentive to Donate Appreciated Assets

Gifts of appreciated property are now deductible at their fair market value instead of their original cost, with no portion of the appreciation subject to the alternative minimum tax. This change, made in the tax law this past summer, should provide donors with more incentive to give charitable organizations more stocks, bonds, artworks, collectibles, real estate and other property which has appreciated in value since it was acquired.

Under the old law, the appreciated portion of the gift was a tax preference item for donors subject to the alternative minimum tax, which diminished the tax planning opportunities of such a gift.

The new law, retroactive to December 31, 1992, al-

lows full value for gifts of appreciated securities up to 30 per cent of adjusted gross income.

Giving gifts of appreciated securities to the Community Foundation can be especially easy for donors. A single gift can benefit several different funds just through the donor's designation at the time of the gift. The security does not need to be re-issued to multiple beneficiaries and savings on commissions can be generated when the security is sold.

At a time of declining services from government, charitable organizations will be asked to play a more important role. Removing the limitations on gifts of appreciated property should greatly help non-profits serve their communities.
