Allied Arts - Artists at School

Allied Arts has developed a new program called *Allied Artists@School* that will help provide guest arts educators to schools in central Oklahoma. The agency is requesting contributions to offset half the cost of providing a guest educator. A \$50 contribution will provide a guest educator for a threehour session. Contributions of larger amounts could also apply to programs that are offered in one- to four-day increments. Schools will work directly with artists who are listed in a resource booklet developed by Allied Arts. The roster includes both visual and performing artists, including actors, dancers, vocalists, storytellers and poets willing to visit schools.

Allied Arts supports cultural agencies in central Oklahoma. The organization, which was established in 1971, has 21 member agencies.

Canterbury Choral Society - Children's Chorus Scholarships

The Canterbury Choral Society and the Canterbury Children's Chorus foster the appreciation and preservation of the art of choral performance. The choruses present regular performances statewide and train and educate vocalists of all ages.

The Children's Chorus serves youth in grades two to twelve. This group is adding a new ensemble beginning with the 2001-2002 concert season. The organization is seeking scholarships for young artists who demonstrate financial need. The expansion will increase the number of participants from 125 to 200 and the number of ensembles to four.

A donation of \$500 will pay for one student's dues, music, uniform and other performance-related costs. Any size contribution may be applied for this program.

The Children's Chorus performs four concerts a season, plus one performance with the Choral Society. While building high quality choruses, the program seeks to instill pride and teamwork in youth.

Guy Fraser Harrison Academy - Student Scholarships

The Guy Fraser Harrison Academy, founded in 1977, provides advanced orchestral education and performance opportunities for talented middle and high school musicians. It provides opportunities for young musicians from many schools to work together to challenge their skills under the direction of respected conductors and music educators.

The Academy has four orchestras: Festival Strings, a non-auditioned string orchestra for sixth and seventh grade students; Harrison Chamber Orchestra, for upper level school string students by audition; Oklahoma Youth Philharmonic, a full orchestra for experienced musicians by audition; and Oklahoma Youth Orchestra, a full orchestra of 100 members for the most advanced high school musicians, also by audition. Yearly tuition ranges from \$180 for Festival Strings to \$300 for the Oklahoma Youth Orchestra.

Each year, the academy seeks to provide numerous partial and full scholarships. Donations are needed to provide scholarships for the 2001-2002 concert season. Contributions may sponsor one or more students' tuition or be earmarked for general scholarship funding.

Oklahoma Visual Arts Coalition - Artists' Workshop

The Oklahoma Visual Arts Coalition supports artists living and working in the state and promotes visual arts through workshops, exhibitions, publications and grants.

The coalition is seeking donors to support workshops. A \$500 donation will underwrite the cost of a workshop, including invitations to artists, speakers' fees and room rental. In addition, a \$100 donation will provide five scholarships for artists. In-kind contributions of catering or printing are also needed. The workshops are part of the coalition's popular Artist Survival Kit (ASK) program, which is a quarterly series of workshops and events that create forums for artists to share common experiences.

American Cancer Society - Patient Transportation

The American Cancer Society provides education, support and resources for cancer patients and their families.

One of the organization's many activities is providing transportation services. Often patients and their families are required to drive 50 miles or more to receive life-saving treatments. The American Cancer Society provides transportation assistance for 60 local patients per year. A donation of \$150 will allow for one cancer patient to travel to a treatment center for a six-week course of radiation treatments. The organization seeks to eliminate cancer as a major health problem by prevention, saving lives and diminishing suffering from the disease through research, education advocacy and service.

Research projects address prevention, detection and treatment. Education efforts include gender-specific information on cancer detection and prevention. Advocacy includes working to keep cancer issues as a top priority on the public agenda. Services include a wide array of patient-focused programs.

The Children's Center - Patient Slings

The Children's Center provides 24 hour medical care, rehabilitative therapies and developmental education to critically ill children with multiple disabilities. Patients have disabilities as a result of birth defects or complications, physical abuse or neglect, debilitating illnesses, accidents and drugdependent parents. More than 95 percent of the patients are confined to bed or a wheelchair. The Center is seeking donations of \$350 to purchase one sling used to transport children from the bed to the wheelchair.

The Center provides inpatient care for approximately 100 children per year. A total of 34 slings are needed for these patients.

Oklahoma Foundation for the Disabled - Park Restoration

The Oklahoma Foundation for the Disabled was established in 1961 to provide recreational, educational and socialization activities for adults and children with physical and/or mental disabilities. The foundation also provides pre-vocational activities for adults. The foundation serves more than 500 individuals.

The organization is currently seeking to restore a common park area, which is used by those its serves for various outdoor activities. Over the years, all original tables and benches have deteriorated.

The organization is asking for donations to cover eight sets of tables at \$140 per set. Also needed are benches at a cost of \$60 each. A total of eight benches will be replaced. The entire group of tables and benches could be purchased by a single donation of \$1,600.

In addition, the foundation is recruiting volunteers that would be willing to landscape the park area and perform general gardening chores.

Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma - Kids Cafe

The Regional Food Bank helps the charitable community effectively feed people in need. In addition to distributing more than 14 million pounds of food this year to agencies in central and western Oklahoma, the organization supports Kids Cafes. This program provides nutritious food and a safe place for low-income children to be after school and in the summer.

At Kids Cafes, children also learn about cooking, nutrition and hygiene, as well as

participate in fun and educational activities.

A donation of \$280 would cover the average cost of providing snacks, meals and activities for one child for one year at a Kids Cafe location.

The Regional Food Bank currently assists 22 Kids Cafes based in churches and community centers. Last year, Kids Cafes served more than 96,000 snacks and meals to hundreds of children in several Oklahoma communities.

Oklahoma Lions Service Foundation - Beds for Boys Ranch

The Oklahoma Lions Service Foundation was created to meet the funding needs for projects approved by the Lions of Oklahoma. One of these projects is the Lions Boys Ranch, which provides comprehensive, community-based long term residential care to neglected and abused boys from age 12 to 18. The primary effort of the Lions Boys Ranch is to provide a safe, nurturing, supportive and structured environment for residents. While at the Ranch, a boy lives in a familylike setting with house parents and other boys. The typical length of stay is between 12 to 18 months before returning home or to a foster home.

The Lions Service Foundation is seeking to replace old beds that are no longer serviceable. The institutional-quality beds, which hold up longer than standard furniture, cost \$427 per bed. The foundation is requesting a total of 8 beds at a total cost of \$3,416.

History

Oklahoma Archeological Survey - Bison Bones Excavation

The Oklahoma Archeological Survey was established as a state agency to plan and conduct programs in the research, resource management and public education related to Oklahoma's recorded history.

The agency is preparing to begin an excavation of bison bones at a location known as Jake's Bluff in Harper County.

The agency is seeking donations to help cover costs of the effort. A \$500 donation would cover the costs of research equipment. including a field vehicle, coring rig and

photographic film. A donation of \$1,000 would support one graduate student for the duration of the field work. Students from the University of Oklahoma will participate in all aspects of the field work and analysis.

The month-long effort is expected to uncover the entire bison bone pile, which is estimated to be about 10,500 years old.

The site contains the residue from the butchering of animal parts removed from a kill, and the excavation will reveal information on how animal kills were processed.

The competition centers on students' performance on an exam dealing with the state's heritage and geography. In the first round of competition, thousands of students from all across the state compete against others within their county.

The association is seeking donations of \$1,000 for scholarships to award. The donor may choose which county receives the donation. In addition, scholarships may be named by the donor. In many cases, donors have chosen to name scholarships in the memory or honor of another individual.

The funds are held in trust until the student enrolls in an institution of higher learning. The funds are then applied to the cost of tuition, books, room and board.

In addition to the scholarship program, the association sponsors the annual Oklahoma Hall of Fame recognition ceremonies and statewide activities for students during Heritage Week.
