## Oklahoma City Police Athletic League - South Rotary Park

The Police Athletic League is a juvenile crime prevention program that provides educational and sporting opportunities for children, especially those from high-risk neighborhoods, in an effort to reach more children in high-crime areas. The League is developing South Rotary Park at 1800 S. Westwood and is offering tennis, basketball, t-ball, baseball, bicycle safety and soccer. The League has already added three baseball fields and five soccer fields and resurfaced

existing tennis courts. The League will need \$5.15 million to complete the project, which includes adding a gymnasium and a field tower and covering costs associated with managing the basketball, baseball and soccer leagues. The following donor levels are available: Individual Field Sponsor - \$5,000; Complex Field Sponsor — \$10,000; Field Tower Sponsor — \$75,000; and Main Facility Sponsor — \$2.5 million.

## Rainbow Fleet - Mobile Toy Library & Child Health Care

Rainbow Fieet provides youth educational and support services to enhance the quality of life for children, their families and childcare professionals. Its Child Care Connection helps families find child care while the Mobile Toy Library visits providers in their homes for one-on-one training and loans educational toys, games and art projects.

The organization is seeking assistance with two of its programs: The Mobile Toy Library and the Child Care Health Consultant. For \$35, a donor can provide the health care consultant with a pediatric blood pressure cuff and a \$40 donation will purchase a set of teeth to use in dental hygiene demonstrations. A \$10 donation will purchase 100 "Scrubby Bear" cards for children who have been taught proper hand washing. The Mobile Toy Library distributes puzzles, games and books.

A cash donation would be used to supplement the library. Rainbow Fleet also welcomes donations of books and art supplies.

## Girls Scouts - Support Outresch Efforts

## Presbyrerian Urban Mission — Santa Store

The children have a Gingerbread Mall to shop for gifts for their parents and grandparents. The Santa Store also assists seniors on limited incomes and patients living in an AIDS care facility with Christmas gifts. A donation of \$25 will provide one of the following gifts: a comforter and slippers for a senior citizen, socks, underwear, mittens and hats for two children, gifts for AIDS patients or three new toys for a child. ## World Neighbors- Uganda Program for Women

The World Neighbors program in Uganda, initiated in 1990, focuses on helping rural women in two districts to develop organizational skills and mobilize local resources to meet their needs. The program works with more than 500 women's groups to implement savings and credit schemes, improved agriculture strategies, small-sale income generation projects and reproductive health training. Each women's group has about 12 members.

The program leaders are in need of bicycles to facilitate outreach activities. While there are more than 100 program leaders, bicycles will be selectively provided to those with more than five groups to reach and with the greatest distances to cover. A donation of \$2,750 will provide 50 bicycles, \$1,650 will provide 30 bicycles, \$550 will provide 10 bicycles and \$55 will provide one bicycle.

## YWCA of Oklahoma City - Crisis Services Program

The YWCA of Oklahoma City administers a Crisis Services Program for victims of domestic violence/sexual assault. The Program's Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) provides victims with immediate, compassionate and culturally sensitive treatment and comprehensive evaluation by a trained medical professional. The program assures that there are professionals trained in collection, preservation, documentation and proper "chain of custody" maintenance for sexual assault evidence. SANE is a collabo-

rative effort between the YWCA, metro area police departments, the district attorney's office and three local hospitals. A \$1,000 gift will provide one week of 24-hour rape crisis hotline services, \$500 will provide clothing for 25 rape victims when they leave the hospital, \$100 will provide photo documentation of forensic evidence for 50 rape exams and \$30 will provide forensic supplies for three rape exams. Other monetary needs include a colposcope for the clinic at a cost of \$26,244.

Payne trains teachers in Alphabetic Phonics, Reading Readiness and Language Basics.

Through its 23 Kids Cafe sites, low-income children receive nutritious food, academic enrichment and a safe haven after school and during the summer. At Kids Cafe, children receive academic tutoring as well as participate in educational activities and learn about cooking, nutrition and hygiene. A donation of \$900 will provide one computer to a Kids

Cafe site, a gift of \$60 can provide reading, math and general educational software for one computer and a gift of \$42 will provide one Microsoft Office program for one computer. A \$23,046 gift would provide one computer and software at each of the 23 sites. The Food Bank is also seeking training services from a qualified computer specialist for its site directors as well as maintenance of the computer workstations.

State law requires that all elementary schools must have a media center equipped

with 2,000 children's books. The Academy falls well short of this requirement and needs donations of story books conducive to elementary-age children. Used story books, with original cover, are acceptable. Encyclopedias and resource books are not included in the state's requirements.

The Academy is also seeking a state certified librarian to work one day a week as a media specialist; this could be a paid position.

## Variety Health Center - Children's Eye Exams & Prescriptions

Variety Health Center provides health care to low-income children and young women through extensive pediatrics, obstetrics and reproductive health programs. In fiscal year 2001-02, the Variety witnessed a 29 percent increase in the number of patients served for a total of 15,500 individuals. Variety is also the state's second largest administrator of the WIC nutrition program.

Many families who utilize the services are not financially able to purchase eyeglasses or

prescriptions. Variety provides assistance through its Specific Assistance Fund to provide eye glasses for children and funding to pay for antibiotic prescriptions for children.

A gift to the Fund of \$37 will provide an eye exam and eyeglasses for one child and \$52 will provide antibiotics for a child during the cold and flu season. Variety also welcomes donated exams by optometric professionals.
