


Maimee L. Browne

Service to her community defined the life of Maimee L. Browne. Using her positive attitude and a boundless amount of enthusiasm, Mrs. Browne initiated a variety of causes from starting college savings programs for school children to organizing the first formal Citizenship Ceremonial in 1922 that remains the model for our country's naturalization ceremony.

After moving to Oklahoma City in 1923, she directed her energy toward numerous projects such as starting parent education classes in Oklahoma City schools and initiating the city's Planned Parenthood Federation. And through her efforts, the Redbud was named the state tree in 1938. Thanks to the earnings from a memorial fund established after her death in 1963, Mrs. Browne's support of her community continues through the Fund for Oklahoma City.

In 2000, the YWCA of Oklahoma City received nearly 500 calls to its 24-hour rape crisis hotline. That same year, the Oklahoma City police recorded 656 incidents of sexual assault.

A key element in reducing these violent crimes is the proper collection of evidence for prosecutors. Thanks to a Great Grant through the Fund for Oklahoma City to the YWCA, sexual assault victims in Oklahoma County are now receiving qualified forensic exams that have led to an increase in the prosecution of perpetrators.

It is estimated the 80 percent of the physical evidence of a sexual assault is located on the victim thus making the proper preservation of any evidence crucial. The YWCA SANE (Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner) program assures that professionals who are trained in the collection, preservation and documentation of evidence treat the sexual assault victims. With the funding through a Great Grant, the SANE program was able to purchase the necessary equipment to facilitate the exams. The SANE program is a collaboration between the

YWCA, law enforcement, victim advocate groups and three metro hospitals. Since its inception in 2002, it is quickly proving to be a valuable asset to police forensic laboratories.

Violent crimes affect not only the victims and their families but the quality of life in the community in which they live. With the help from a Great Grant, the SANE program is reducing these types of crimes in Oklahoma County.
