DARE TO DREAM FOOTLOCKER PROJECT

Wanting to expand a science and mathematics education enhancement program for students at under performing elementary schools. Rose State College faculty came to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. With a Great Grant through the Fund for Oklahoma City, the science and mathematics faculty – known as the Dare to Dream Team – are addressing the problem by working directly with more students and teachers.


The Rose State College faculty were concerned with the increase in the number of Oklahoma City area elementary students receiving unsatisfactory scores in science and mathematics. With the understanding that undeveloped skills in science and mathematics would impact these students for the rest of their lives, they were determined to make a difference.

Thanks to a Great Grant, the Dare to Dream Team purchased and stocked two portable footlockers containing age-appropriate resources and materials on subjects ranging from chemistry, physics, earth science, astronomy and mathematics. The faculty are now able to take these resources into numerous classrooms and work with the students and teachers in a variety of interactive lessons. The footlockers and their resources, which include activity guides and instructions on implementation, are also available for teachers to checkout. A desire to help combined with the ability of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation to meet key issues affecting our community resulted in a Great Grant that is sparking children's interest in science and mathematics and providing them with tools to succeed.
