

Born in 1903 to German immigrants, Walter Stiller was known as a gentle and quiet man. A member of Zion Lutheran Church for 84 years, the longtime treasurer for Macklanburg Duncan was held in high regard by his employer and for some time was the only non-family stockholder at the company.

Soon after his death in 2002 at the age of 99, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation was notified that Mr. Stiller had included a significant gift — more than \$725,000 — in his estate to establish a fund with the direction that the money be used for general charitable purposes within the community.

It is Mr. Stiller and donors like him who have made unrestricted gifts to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation that make Great Grants and the Fund for Oklahoma City possible. Course

A graduation celebration brought together Clemente Course students, teachers and sponsors.



Fifteen Oklahoma City residents who live below the poverty line took what may be a first step to improving their lives, thanks in part to a Great Grant through the Fund for Oklahoma City.

Through Oklahoma City University's Clemente Course, these 15 adults, ranging between the ages of 18-35, discovered a new belief system through an intense study of philosophy, literature, writing and composition and U.S. History. Taught by OCU faculty, the course is based upon the concept that the study of the humanities may encourage students to utilize more reflective and critical thinking versus emotional thinking.

To qualify for the course, the students' household income had to fall below the U.S. Census Bureau poverty levels, they had to speak

and write English proficiently and they had to commit to attend 48, 120-minute long sessions. Through a partnership with Oklahoma City Community College, the students earned nine hours of college credit with the successful completion of the course.

For Freddie, a 38-year-old unemployed man who participated in the class with his wife, the course offered an opportunity to learn and grow. "I am grateful to have experienced the Clemente Course," he says. "I am applying much of the thought-provoking studies from the philosophy class every day. I feel more enlightened and awakened than I have in several years."
