Dear Donors and Friends of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation:

It is our pleasure to present the 2008 annual report. You will note that as in years past, the report first provides information on our donors, both those who have given in the past and those who shared their generosity during the year. Without the donors' support, we wouldn't be able to fulfill our mission of serving the charitable needs of our community. We hope you take a few moments and read the donor highlights. These are just a handful of people, past and present, who make what we do possible. If you've given through the Oklahoma City Community Foundation at any time over the past 39 years, we are grateful to you.

During the year, we continued to see a steady increase of new advised funds. Our development staff works with professional advisors and donors to craft a giving plan that works for the donor and helps them achieve their charitable and financial goals. In addition, the number of charities that have endowments through our Charitable Organization Endowment Program continues to increase. At year's end, the number had reached 285. This is the largest program of its type in the country and you can read more about it on page 47. The John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge was a unique opportunity to recognize the 100th anniversary of our founder's birth and at the same time offer charitable organization and scholarship endowments the chance to participate in a dollar-for-dollar match to potentially increase their funds by up to \$10,000.

The past year generated disappointing investment results for all investors but we strongly believe that our focus on a diversified investment portfolio combined with a prudent distribution policy allowed us to have a stronger year than many others. It is important to note that because the distributions for most of our permanent funds are based on an 8 guarter average market value, most of the cash distributions for 2008 were higher than in 2007. Please contact us for more information on our investment and distribution policies.

In 2009, we will celebrate our 40th anniversary. It is hard to believe the changes we've seen not only in our own lives but also throughout the community. One thing has not changed over the past four decades and that is the power of endowment. Our organization exists to provide donors and charitable organizations alike a chance to create permanent funds - endowments - that will have a lasting impact.



Celebrating John Kirkpatrick's life

February 13, 2008 was a wonderful day at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. On what would have been the 100th birthday of our founder, John E. Kirkpatrick, more than 300 donors and friends attended a special reception. The highlight of the evening was a video produced in honor of Mr. Kirkpatrick. The video captured three distinct phases of his life: as a family man, a patriot and a philanthropist. The video included interviews with 13 friends, family and colleagues as well as footage from several interviews of John and Eleanor Kirkpatrick. The video presents a clear picture of the impact the couple had on the Oklahoma City community.

Match Challenge and Building Dedication

During the celebration, two important announcements were made during the reception. First, Christian K. Keesee, the Kirkpatrick Family Fund and the Oklahoma City Community Foundation announced a significant gift that paid tribute to Mr. Kirkpatrick's generosity and will impact our entire community. A \$3.3 million challenge – the John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge was offered to 350 charitable organization endowment funds and scholarship funds to increase their endowments with a dollar-for-dollar match up to \$5,000. Match challenges were a true hallmark of Mr. Kirkpatrick's philanthropy. For more information on the Challenge, please see page 69.

Next, Kirkland Hall, board president, announced that the Trustees had voted to dedicate the new Oklahoma City Community Foundation building in honor of Mr. Kirkpatrick on what would have been his 100th birthday. The building was dedicated to Mr. Kirkpatrick for "his leadership, vision and his encouragement of philanthropy throughout the community."

With the help of the Kirkpatrick family archivists, a special photograph display featuring seldom seen images of Mr. Kirkpatrick was available during the celebration. The photographs on this page were part of the display.

New television commercials, revised Web site increase awareness

One of the results of the 2004 Long Range Plan conducted by the Trustees was to increase the awareness of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation to a broader audience who were not donors nor had received any of our printed materials. As you may recall, we worked with Jordan Associates to produce a series of television commercials that began airing on both network and cable stations in the fall of 2004. We used these television commercials as well as radio commercials at certain times through 2007. These commercials featured donor stories and the resulting benefit of their charitable gifts. Research showed that the commercials had increased the general awareness of our organization within the area.

In 2008, the Trustees committed to producing new television commercials that told similar donor stories and provided more specific information of charitable giving as well as encourage viewers to visit our Web site. Again working with Jordan Associates, we produced six 30-second television commercials that began airing in September. These commercials feature mainly living donors and we are grateful to each of them for agreeing to be featured and participate in the production. We will use these six commercials at varying times during the next several years to continue to promote the Oklahoma City Community, Foundation and reach new donors who want to leave a legacy for the community. A New Look for www.OCCF.org

For several years, our Web site has been considered a valuable resource for donors, professional advisors and charitable organizations. As a result of the new television commercials, the Web site received an overall revision in appearance and navigation.

To help familiarize you with the revised site, below is a guick guide.

Navigating the Site

We've reorganized the Web site into eight sections. You will find the navigation for these sections at the top of each Web page. As you place your cursor over each section name, a menu will drop down and list the pages included within that section. As you go to a section page, you will notice that that section's navigation now appears on the right hand side with easy links to additional section pages.

A snapshot of each section:

Donors – includes information and resources for anyone who has made a gift or is considering a gift to the Oklahoma City

Community Foundation. This is where you'll find DonorCentral, fund policies and agreements, Central Oklahoma Charities and a link to the Online Giving page where we accept gifts to endowments from donors using major credit cards.

Professional Advisors – we've created a section that addresses the specific needs of professional and financial advisors as they work with their clients on charitable giving. Visitors will find information about our services, fund policies and agreements, the Planned Giving Design Center and information on our investment management.

Nonprofit Services – we offer a variety of resources for charitable organizations in the community. This section includes Community Programs, the Kirkpatrick Family Fund, the Planned Giving Design Center, Central Oklahoma Charities and additional resources.

Community Resources – we've compiled several resources that benefit all residents interested in charitable giving and our community as a whole. Visitors will find Central Oklahoma Charities, Great Places To Walk, Online Giving and a link to ReadOKC.org, a Web site directory of literacy resources available in our community.

Scholarship Center – in addition to our Trustee Scholarship Initiative, we also administer the state's largest independent scholarship program. All scholarships are listed in a directory that includes application forms as appropriate. For students and parents, we also offer guidelines on financial aid and college admissions.

Documents – formerly known as the Forms Library, visitors can now easily find fund policy statements and agreements and grant and scholarship applications either in an alphabetical or categorical listing.

About Us – we've added our history, how we're governed, our most recent audited financial statements and answered frequently asked questions. Many of our publications are also available online.

Home – takes you back to the opening page.

Additions


To ease your efforts to locate information, we've added a search component to the site. Located in the top left corner, you can search the entire Web site by typing in key words or phrases.

You may notice that several sections share common information such as Online Giving, Central Oklahoma Charities, Investment Management and Fund Policy Statements and Agreement Forms. We did this to ensure the resources we offer are easily accessible. When you are viewing a shared page, the right navigation will revert to the main sections. Use your back key to return to prior page.

Visitors now have the ability to increase and decrease the size of the type on each page. Click on Smaller Type/Larger Type to adjust the size of the type.

We now have the ability to add color images and photographs, making the site more inviting and interesting.

Fund and Gift Options

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation offers a variety of current and planned giving opportunities that can help individuals and families reach both their charitable and financial goals. We can assist with your philanthropic planning, offering administrative services for funds and trusts including:

- · Alternatives to Private Foundations

Affiliated Funds: An Alternative to Private Foundations

An Affiliated Fund is a 509(a)(3) supporting organization of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation and offers the type of donor involvement available through a private foundation but without many of the restrictions. In addition, the administrative support we provide makes an Affiliated Fund a very cost-effective option.

Advised Funds

We offer three options of Advised Funds that make charitable giving simple and flexible for donors. For more information on our Advised Fund options, please see page 62.

Charitable Organization Endowments

In 1970, one gift from one donor established the first charitable organization endowment at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. That gift launched what is today the largest endowment program for charitable organizations in the United States with 285 nonprofits participating in the program. You may want to consider a gift to an existing organizational endowment or creating a fund that benefits a specific organization.

Scholarship and Award Funds

With oversight for more than 100 scholarship and award funds, we administer the state's largest independent scholarship program. The funds provide support for individuals who are seeking to improve themselves through higher education or additional post-high school training.

Field of Interest Funds

If you are interested in supporting a general charitable area – such as foster children, the environment, animal welfare – you may want to consider a Field of Interest Fund. This type of endowment allows you to target the benefit of the fund to a type of charitable need and allows the Oklahoma City Community Foundation Trustees to administer the fund accordingly.

Types of Gifts We Accept

Once you determine the type of charitable fund you'd like to establish, the next step is deciding what and when to give. Below are the types of gifts we accept:

Cash Gifts

Cash is one of the easiest ways to make a charitable contribution. A cash contribution to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation can be in the form of cash, check, money order or cashiers check. We also accept credit card gifts to existing endowments online via a secure Web site at www.occf.org/donate.

Real Estate

Real estate may be given at appraised value. If appreciated, capital gains tax may be avoided on the real estate appreciation if the property is contributed directly to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Gifting real estate may allow you to preserve liquid assets while maximizing your charitable contributions.

Business-Related Assets

A Gift of Love

During 2008, Millard Gardner made several gifts of cash to the Central High School Alumni Association endowment in memory of his wife, Helen P. Oldham Gardner, who died in 2007. The couple both graduated from Central High School in 1947. The Central High School Alumni Association was formed in 1982 and through its scholarship endowment at the Oklahoma City Community

Foundation, the group provides scholarships to students who graduate from central Oklahoma high schools. Central High School was the first high school in Oklahoma City and although the school closed in 1968, its alumni like Mr. Gardner continue the school's tradition of quality education by helping deserving students continue their education after high school.

We are able to accept gifts of individually-owned business assets such as closely held C-corp. and S-corp. stock, partnerships and LLCs.

Stocks, Bonds and Mutual Funds

If appreciated, marketable or closely-held securities such as stocks, bonds and mutual funds can offer you significant tax savings while maximizing their charitable contributions. The securities may be given so that you receive an income tax deduction equal to the fair market value of the donated assets while avoiding the capital gains tax. We have accounts at most brokerage firms and can arrange for the transfer of the donated securities.

Oil and Gas Interests & Royalty Interests

Both oil and gas royalty interests may also be donated to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. The contribution of oil and gas interests may allow for the preservation of liquid assets while maximizing the charitable contributions.

Life Insurance

Life insurance can be an effective means to fund a charitable giving plan without significant outlays of cash. Since life insurance generally results in a large payment at one time, this can be an ideal vehicle to initiate family philanthropy through the establishment of an advised fund.

Deferring Your Giving As An Option

Making a planned gift to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation is a simple and flexible way to make a lasting impact on the community because a single planned gift can support one or many charitable interests.

Charitable Gift Annuities

A charitable gift annuity (CGA) provides individuals 55 years or older with not only income for life but also the peace of mind of making a difference through a lasting gift to the community. Through a CGA, you can make a gift with cash or other assets of at least \$20,000, receive income for life and, at the end of the annuity, the remaining assets will go to the charitable fund or funds of your choosing. We offer six CGA options.

Charitable Remainder Trusts

A charitable remainder trust allows you to place assets in a trust that pays annual income to you or a beneficiary for life or a term of years. You can avoid capital gains tax on the donated assets and also receive an income tax deduction for the fair market value of the remainder interest of the trust. In addition, the trust is removed from the estate, reducing subsequent estate taxes. Upon the trust's termination, the remaining assets will benefit an existing endowment or advised fund.

Charitable Lead Trusts

A charitable lead trust allows you to transfer assets to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation that then pays a percentage of the assets' value to an endowment you've designated. At the end of the trust term, the remaining assets are passed on to designated heirs. Charitable lead trusts offer several advantages including greatly discounted gift or estate taxes and any growth in the assets will be free of these taxes for the heirs. In certain cases, a charitable lead trust may also provide an income tax deduction at the time the trust is created.

Retirement Plan Assets

Retirement plan assets are subject not only to estate taxes, but also income taxes. To reduce this burden on heirs and to create a charitable legacy, you can use any retirement plan asset to maximize charitable contributions by establishing an Advised Fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Your heirs can serve as advisors to the fund, ensuring that your charitable interests are continued into the future. NOTE: If you will be 70 ½ years of age in 2008 or 2009, you may want to consider a charitable IRA rollover. For more information on this time-limited giving opportunity, please see pages 10-11.

Bequests

With a bequest, you can designate a percentage, the residual or their entire estate to benefit an existing fund or to establish a new fund. This option may provide you and your family with substantial reductions in federal estate taxes. We offer sample bequest language at www.occf.org.

What is a planned gift?

A planned gift describes any charitable gift that is made as part of a donor's tax or estate plan, that may provide an income benefit to the donor or that provides a tax-deduction exceeding a single-year. The Oklahoma City Community Foundation recognizes that each individual's planned giving needs and desires are unique and, as a result, we offer donors the options outlined on this page. We encourage anyone considering a planned gift to charity to discuss this option with their professional advisor. In accepting a contribution to any fund, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation trustees commit to the donor that the contributions will be protected for the charitable purpose originally intended. The variance power, as described in the governing documents of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, assures donors that if the charitable purpose of their contributions becomes impractical or impossible, the distributions will be directed to similar purposes in the community.

^{**}A portion of income is considered return of principal calculated on mortality tables, therefore resulting in a tax-free distribution for a limited time.

Making the Gift of a Lifetime:

Turning Retirement Accounts into Charitable Gifts

For the tax years 2008 and 2009, individuals age 70½ and older can transfer up to \$100,000 per year from an individual retirement account (IRA) to a charitable organization without incurring income taxes today or estate tax in the future. If married, each spouse can transfer \$100,000 per year from his or her IRA. Prior to this law all lifetime distributions from IRAs were taxed even if the distribution benefited a charitable cause. The provision is time-limited; it applies only to qualified distributions made before January I, 2010.

Using IRA assets to make a gift during your life as opposed to giving via a bequest in your will allows you to enjoy the impact of a gift made during your lifetime. It is important to note that the law only permits gifts to "public charities" and not a supporting organization or to a donor advised fund at a charity. Also, the distribution cannot be made to a private foundation or to a split interest gift such as a charitable remainder trust or a charitable gift annuity.

Because the Oklahoma City Community Foundation is a public charity, we can accommodate an IRA charitable distribution for a variety of charitable purposes:

- A Donor Designated Fund allows a donor to designate one or more charitable beneficiary organizations at the time the gift is made.
- A gift to a Charitable Organization Endowment will help ensure an annual stream of income for a favorite charity or organization.
- A gift to a Scholarship and Award Fund will provide automatic annual awards for students as designated by the donor at the time the gift is made.
- The **Fund for Oklahoma City** is an unrestricted fund that allows the Trustees to address a broad range of current and future needs and opportunities through strategic grants to charitable organizations.
- Through a gift to a **Field of Interest Fund**, the donor can designate support to a charitable interest area at the time the gift is made.

Who can make this distribution?

- The donor must be 70½ years of age at the time of the gift. (Under IRA minimum distribution rules, an individual must generally begin making withdrawals by April 1 following the year in which he or she reaches 70½)
- The gift must be made from a traditional or Roth IRA.
- The limit on charitable gifts from any single donor for each year is \$100,000. A couple may both contribute if they meet the age requirement and both have IRAs.

Who should consider utilizing this benefit?

- Individuals who take the standard deduction.
- Individuals who annually give more than 50 percent of their income to charity or who exceed the percentage income limitation for gifts.
- Individuals with adjusted gross income (AGI) exceeding \$150,500 (\$75,250 for married filing separately) and who are subject to the itemized deduction reduction.
- Individuals who are taking mandatory IRA distributions and do not need the income but would like to make contributions to charity.
- Individuals in states that do not provide a deduction for charitable gifts.
- Individuals who may consider leaving the remainder of an IRA to charity or making a bequest from an IRA who may prefer to see the gift made during their lifetime.

Is an IRA Charitable Distribution Right for You?

If you answer yes to any of the following questions, you may want to discuss with your professional advisor the benefits of transferring assets from your IRA to make a qualifying charitable distribution.

Are you planning to leave a charitable legacy through your estate plan?

Have you designated your favorite charity as the beneficiary of your retirement assets?

Have your retirement savings and investment growth exceeded your expectations?

Are you subject to a charitable deduction limitation by giving more than 50 percent of your income to charity?

Do you take the standard deduction on your tax return and make annual gifts to your favorite charities?

Do you take the minimum distributions from your IRA but have adequate alternative sources of income?

If you take greater distributions from your retirement plans, does doing so affect the amount of Social Security benefits that are taxed? (If income is greater than \$32,000 or \$44,000, respectively, 50 percent or 85 percent of benefits are taxed.)

Do you have adjusted gross income above \$150,500 (\$75,250 for married filing separately), which causes a phase-out of itemized deductions and personal exemptions?

Is there a special cause that you care about?

Do you want the assurance that your charitable gift will make the greatest impact?



How Your IRA Charitable Rollover Gift Can Have a Lasting Impact

Contribute to the existing endowment for a charity

- Gifts can be made in any amount.
- 285 charitable organizations have endowments at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation.
- Annual distributions support operations of charities.

Create a new endowment for a charity

- New endowments can be established for specific organizations with a \$20,000 gift.
- Most charities, churches and non-profit organizations are eligible.
- Endowments are invested and protected by the Oklahoma City Community Foundation.

Create a designated fund for a group of charities

- A fund can be established with \$10,000 with a number of specific charities named to share in the annual distribution.
- Earnings are distributed annually based on this designation.

Create a scholarship fund

- A fund can be established for \$20,000 for a specific purpose.
- A contribution of \$10,000 will name an existing scholarship in honor or in memory of a specific person.
- A contribution can be made in any amount to more than 80 existing scholarships.

Create an Unrestricted or Field of Interest Fund

- A fund can be established for \$10,000 in honor or in memory of someone.
- The earnings will be used by the Trustees to meet the changing needs of the community or in support of:

Children's Services
Health and Wellness
Literacy Training
Beautification of Parks and Public Spaces
Seniors Living Independently

We are here to assist you

IRA administrators may have special forms to assist with the IRA charitable rollover. For your convenience, we have posted on our Web site – www.occf.org/giving – sample language for letters that can be used to start the distribution process and to inform the Oklahoma City Community Foundation of your intentions. We will provide you with the appropriate acknowledgement to ensure that your gift qualifies for the tax-free IRA distribution.

Using an IRA distribution to establish a scholarship endowment

Dortha Dever credits the education she received while attending Oklahoma City University as setting her on a path to a successful banking career that included 32 years at American Fidelity. "I received some important fundamentals in business and finance for which I am so grateful," she says. Although she's retired, this mother and grandmother remains active with her church and several civic organizations.

In 2007, she took advantage of a new law that allowed her to make a distribution directly from her retirement account to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation without incurring any federal tax on the gift. With the distribution, Dortha established a scholarship endowment fund that will provide support to low-income students seeking a business degree. Award recipients are recommended by the dean of the business school at Oklahoma City University.



Special Donors

Special Donor Funds are large endowments with assets in excess of \$500,000 that offer flexibility and simplicity to the donors who establish them. Through our vast community knowledge and a proven investment performance that adds to the value of the original gift, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation ensures that the charitable goals of the donors are carried forth in an effective manner. (1987) The widow of oilman Featherstone H. Allen, Mrs. Allen left a bequest from her estate to support the Fund for Oklahoma City.

H.W. Almen/West OKC Rotary Scholarship Fund

(2004) Oklahoma City businessman Harold William Almen was a longtime member of the West OKC Rotary Club. Following his death in 2003, a bequest in his estate left a \$1.3 million gift to the club for scholarships to encourage Oklahoma students to pursue higher education at a vocational school, college or university. The club used the gift to create this fund which the Oklahoma City Community Foundation administers.

Annie & Isaac Bloom Educational Scholarship

(2001) Esther Bloom was a generous yet anonymous supporter of Emanuel Synagogue. When she died in 1997, she left her estate to the synagogue and asked that it be used to establish a fund in her parents' memory that would benefit the education of children of the congregation.

Margaret Annis Boys Trust

(1991) As a teacher and principal for 42 years, Margaret Annis Boys touched the lives of countless Oklahoma City children. She loved traveling around the world, but dearly loved Oklahoma and its native habitat. Upon her death in 1990, Miss Boys' entire estate was left to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation to establish an endowment through which the earnings are used for the beautification of parks and public lands in Oklahoma City.

Thomas & Patricia Dix Brewer

(1992) Thomas Brewer was born in Oklahoma City and now lives in Missouri where he manages a health service program for elderly patients. His wife, Dr. Pat Brewer, is an obstetrician specializing in high-risk patients. The Brewers' gift of an insurance policy established an advised fund that supports distributions "to promote the values of justice and peace."

B.C. Clark Family Fund

(1992) In recognition of the 100th anniversary of B.C. Clark Jewelers in 1992, members of the family established an advised fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. In 1892, young B.C. Clark, newly trained in watchmaking by his brother, moved to Purcell, Indian Territory, and set up his workbench in the corner of a five and dime on Main Street. Most of Mr. Clark's first customers were railroad workers who's livelihood depended upon precise timepieces. In 1929, Mr. Clark moved the business to downtown Oklahoma City. Surviving the Dust Bowl, the Great Depression and other economic challenges, the business has continued to be owned and operated by family members into the fourth generation. "We are pioneer Oklahomans; our roots are here," said B.C. Clark Jr. when the family established the fund. "Oklahoma City has been good to us in business and we think this is the best avenue to do something for a number of charities."

Emanuel Synagogue

(2003) Congregation Emanuel was founded in Oklahoma City in 1904. The Synagogue is a traditional, egalitarian congregation affiliated with The United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism. The trustees of the Emanuel Synagogue Endowment Fund moved the assets of the fund to take advantage of the long-term oversight and investment opportunities available through the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. This was the first fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation to benefit a faith community.

Irene P. & Samuel F. Frierson Educational Trust

(1997) The fund was established by the Frierson Educational Trust to provide scholarships to students attending college in Oklahoma. Dr. Frierson was a native of Mississippi who practiced medicine in Oklahoma City and died in 1961. Scholarships are awarded through the Trustee Scholarship Initiative.

Edward King Gaylord Scholarship Fund

(1970) Mr. Gaylord established the fund prior to his death and further funded it through a bequest in his estate. A native of Kansas, Mr. Gaylord and two partners bought The Daily Oklahoman and formed the Oklahoma Publishing Company in 1903. The fund supports scholarships awarded through the Trustee Scholarship Initiative.

Robert A. Herring Trust

(2006) Established through a bequest in Mr. Herring's estate to support medical research related to Parkinson's disease and genetic disorders. Mr. Herring was the long-time owner of the Chelsea, Oklahoma weekly newspaper.

G. Ed Hudgins Family Fund

(1989) Ed Hudgins was a founding partner of the Oklahoma City architectural and engineering firm Hudgins, Thompson and Ball, later HTB, Inc. A graduate of Oklahoma A&M College and a World War II veteran, he established the fund to support donor advised distributions and a scholarship at Oklahoma State University College of Architecture and Engineering.

William M. & Janet S. Johnson Scholarship Fund

(1987) Established through bequests from Mr. and Mrs. Johnson to provide opportunities for Minco, Oklahoma high school graduates and for nursing students in Oklahoma. Mr. Johnson, a native of Minco, was a long-time employee of Gulf Oil. The fund also supports the Nurse Education Program, an initiative of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation that works with five area hospitals to address the nursing shortage in critical care facilities.



John E. & Eleanor B. Kirkpatrick

(1969) Ten years after establishing their own private foundation, the Kirkpatricks established the Oklahoma City Community Foundation in 1969 to provide opportunities for donors in the community to support charitable causes and organizations. Mr. Kirkpatrick served as the founding President from 1969-79 and again as a Trustee from 1985-91. The couple's philanthropic efforts were as generous as they were varied. Over a period of 20 years, they supported a dollar-for-dollar challenge match program for charitable organizations with endowments at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. In all, the challenges generated more than \$58 million in endowment assets for more than 230 organizations. Mrs. Kirkpatrick died in 1998 and Mr. Kirkpatrick passed away in 2006. Together, the couple created a charitable legacy that will benefit the community for generations.

John E. Kirkpatrick Community Fund

(1996) Established by Mr. Kirkpatrick to continue his support of charitable activities in Oklahoma City, the fund's primary purpose is to support the initiatives and focus areas selected by the Trustees that will help meet the community's needs and opportunities. The fund has supported the Oklahoma City Community Foundation's Parks & Public Spaces Initiative as well as match challenges for charitable organization endowments and other Trustee initiatives.

Lawton Retail Merchants Association

(1998) Through the operation of a credit bureau serving southwest Oklahoma, the Lawton Retail Merchants Association has generated thousands of dollars of support for the Lawton area. The association is a primary funding source for the Lawton Community Foundation, an Affiliated Fund of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, and has provided matching grants for 21 charitable organizations to establish endowments with the Lawton Community Foundation.

Edward P. & Norma Leslie Fund

(2004) Established by a bequest of a trust in the couple's estate, the fund supports a variety of charitable interests the Leslies shared during their 62-year marriage, as well as the Fund for Oklahoma City. Ed was an Oklahoma City businessman who spent more than 60 years in the insurance industry and demonstrated daily his commitment to community and service to others.

McGee Foundation Fund

(2001) The fund supports scholarships for first generation students and foster children through the Trustee Scholarship Initiative. Dean A. McGee was one of the founders of Kerr McGee and was one of nine original Trustees of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. He and his wife Dorthea founded the McGee Foundation in 1963.

Bill & Sally McNutt Foundation

(2005) Janet McNutt transferred the assets of her late parents' private foundation and established an endowment to support the family's charitable interests. Mr. McNutt was a businessman and practiced law in Oklahoma City and Mrs. McNutt was an active volunteer. Although the couple relocated to Texas in the 1980s, they continued to support charitable interests in Oklahoma City.

Milton & Mary Meier Fund

(2005) Established by a bequest through Mrs. Meier's estate, this fund supports the Fund for Oklahoma City. A native of Arkansas, Mary graduated with a journalism degree from the University of Oklahoma in 1943. While working for The Daily Oklahoman, she met Milton Meier, an editor, whom she married in 1947. In 1993, Mrs. Meier created the Lt. Felix Christopher McKean Fund in memory of her brother who was killed in World War II. In addition to this fund, Mrs. Meier's bequest also established the following funds in honor and memory of family members: David Felix McKean and Felix Christopher McKean Fund, Alice and Karl Meier Fund and the Christina Moore McKean and Mary and Christopher Moore Fund.



Scott Smith

An Oklahoma City native and graduate of Central High School, Scott P. Smith was also a dedicated family man and philanthropist. A veteran of the 55th Fighter Group in the U.S. Air Force, he moved to Florida in 1969 and became involved in the automobile business. After 15 years, he purchased a Harley-Davidson dealership which became Scott Smith's Harley-Davidson of Seminole County. He also opened several billiards halls with a group of friends.

An avid tournament marlin fisherman with homes in Florida and the Bahamas, he was a true outdoorsman, Mr. Smith also enjoyed scuba diving, snow skiing, golf and trap shooting and owning, restoring and racing P-51 aircraft. Described by friends and family as a person who could talk to anyone and who took great joy in helping others, Mr. Smith affected the lives of many individuals and organizations through his kindness and generosity. In 2000, Mr. Smith and his wife of 44 years, Geneva, began making gifts to support the Central High School Alumni Association fund and several charitable organization endowments. Mr. Smith died in March of 2008.

Ruth Mershon Fund

(2001) After graduating from the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine in 1949, Ruth Mershon practiced anesthesiology until her retirement in 1996. Through a bequest of the remainder value of retirement accounts and other estate gifts, she established a fund that is advised by her family to support several scholarship interests and her fondness for animals.

Donna Nigh Foundation

(1996) In honor of the former Oklahoma first lady's work on behalf of the state's developmentally disabled, a group of friends established the Donna Nigh Foundation in 1985. The foundation supports grants to provide adaptive equipment for those in group homes or individuals cared for by their families. In 1996, the foundation was moved to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation.

Oklahoma City Jewish **Community Foundation**

(1999) A collection of funds was transferred by the Oklahoma City Jewish Community Foundation to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation in 1999. The earnings support the Jewish Federation of Greater Oklahoma City and a wide range of activities of interest to the Oklahoma City Jewish population. Funds within the Oklahoma City Jewish Community Foundation include:

Clarence E. Page

(1987) An aviation pioneer, Clarence E. Page established the Oklahoma Air Space Museum in 1980. Mr. Page, whose family made the 1889 Land Run into Oklahoma, witnessed the first airplane flight in Oklahoma City and learned to fly as an Army pilot during World War I. During World War II, he conducted a primary flight training school for 8,500 cadets at Cimarron Field (now Clarence E. Page Airport) and Mustang Field in El Reno. Mr. Page was the principal donor to the Oklahoma Air Space Museum and served as president and curator until his retirement in 1988. Contributions support the museum.

William T. Payne Fund

(1976) William T. Payne, the founder of Big Chief Drilling, earned his way through college selling pots and pans. Mr. Payne's gift, funded through a bequest from his estate, was the first significant bequest received by the Oklahoma City Community Foundation and more than doubled its total assets at the time. Earnings support donor advised distributions, Oklahoma Christian University and other charitable organization endowments.

F. M. & Thelma Petree

(1977) F.M. "Pete" Petree earned his law degree from the University of Oklahoma. He married Thelma in 1939. In addition to establishing Liberty Mortgage, Mr. Petree was chairman of the executive committee of Oklahoma City University and helped the university recover from near bankruptcy to sound financial footing. Mr. Petree wass a past Trustee of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Contributions support Oklahoma City University and other charitable organization endowments.

Winona S. Presley Fund

(1999) After graduating from Oklahoma A&M College, Winona Shingleton taught school before marrying Edwin L. Presley in 1952. During her life, Mrs. Presley established endowments for the Oklahoma 4-H Foundation, the University of Central Oklahoma and Oklahoma City University. Her beguest to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation supports the Fund for Oklahoma City and continues her strong interest in education.

Ramsey Family/Blue & Gold Sausage Fund

(1979) While working as an agricultural education teacher and FFA advisor in the 1960s. Mr. Ramsey began processing the students' pigs into sausage that they would sell to fund activities. The idea of selling a high quality sausage product as fundraiser took off and the family soon founded Blue & Gold Sausage Co. The family started an advised fund in 2001 to perpetuate their support of agricultural education scholarships and programs.

Edna Ratliff Fund

(2001) Edna Ratliff moved to Oklahoma City in the 1920s to attend business school and soon began working for Liberty National Bank. One of the first female trust officers in Oklahoma, she worked for the bank for 48 years before retiring in 1976. Contributions from her estate, including mineral interests, support several health-related organizations and other community needs.

Records-Johnston Family Foundation

(1979) Ross Johnston established the foundation in honor of his father, Willard Johnston, who made the 1889 Land Run and later started the first commercial bank in Shawnee, Okla. Ross joined his father in the banking business after World War I. He later entered the mortgage business, helping to establish Midland Mortgage Company, now known as The Midland Group headed by his son-in-law, George J. Records. Contributions support Casady School and other education and scholarship funds.

A. Tom F. & Gladys Seale

(1986) Although childless, the Seales loved children. Tom was an engineer with Kerr McGee and is credited with designing and overseeing the building of the first off-shore drilling rig. Prior to Tom's death in 1989, they established a donor advised fund to support several youthserving organizations. Mrs. Seale died in 2006. A bequest in their estate ensured the fund will support the organizations the Seales cared about as a couple.

Willie Elizabeth Shipley Scholarship Fund

(1981) The fund was established through a beguest in Miss Shipley's will to provide scholarships for students who reside in western Oklahoma. A native of Mangum and a long-time employee of the Oklahoma State Senate, Miss Shipley directed that the awards not be made strictly on academic achievement. Awards from the fund are made through the Oklahoma Youth With Promise program that assists Oklahoma foster children seeking a higher education.

Southwest Homebuilders **Association Fund**

(1999) The Southwest Homebuilders Association represents more than 50 homebuilders who build a project house each year and donate a portion of the profits from the sale to a charitable organization or project. The proceeds from the sale of property established the fund that benefits charitable organizations in south Oklahoma City and the Wendell Stewart Scholarship Fund.



(1994) The fund was established through a bequest from Ms. Steward to serve the basic welfare and health needs of the people of Oklahoma City. The fund has been used to support direct service organizations working with the poor and disabled, to construct a medical clinic and to assist with services for those going from welfare to work. Ms. Steward was the daughter of Judge Seymour and Mary Grace Steward and worked for many years at First National Bank.

Walter Stiller Fund

(2002) The fund was established through a bequest from Mr. Stiller to support the Fund for Oklahoma City. Born and raised in Oklahoma City, Mr. Stiller retired as treasurer of Macklanburg-Duncan. A member of Zion Lutheran Church since 1918, Mr. Stiller lived to the age of 99.

Tom A. Thomas Jr.

(1979) Tom A. Thomas Jr. flew 78 combat missions in World War II and later built a large collection of World War II aircraft. Along with his brother, he operated Thomas Concrete and was active in the pre-cast concrete business for 26 years. Gifts from trusts established in his estate benefit more than 40 charitable organizations.

Thomas Utterback Fund

(1999) The fund was established through a bequest in Mr. Utterback's will. A longtime banker in Oklahoma City, Mr. Utterback was an active supporter of the Capitol Hill area. The fund supports projects in the area and scholarships.

R. A. Young Foundation Fund

(2007) See highlight this page.





R.A. Young

Born in Indian Territory in 1904, R.A. Young was an astute businessman who loved Oklahoma. His commitment to the state was evident in not only his business life but also through his philanthropy. One of the founders of TG&Y, Mr. Young oversaw a company that grew from a regional chain in the 1930s to a national force with more than 920 stores in 29 states when the company was sold in the 1960s.

Mr. Young was generous with both his business expertise and his giving to many civic and charitable organizations including the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum, the Oklahoma City Museum of Art and the Greater Oklahoma City Chamber. A graduate of Oklahoma State University, Mr. Young endowed several chairs at his alma mater and Oklahoma Baptist University. He also awarded numerous scholarships to worthy students with one caveat: they had to attend a college or university in Oklahoma. Mr. Young and his wife Verna also established a scholarship at Casady School in memory of their daughter Carolyn Young Hodnett. Through a bequest in the couple's estate, a portion of their private foundation was transferred to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation and makes annual grants to several local charitable organizations, including the public library in his hometown of Kingfisher.



Family Affiliated Funds

Family Affiliated Funds are an excellent alternative to private foundations. Through this fund option, donors and their family are able to play an active role in the distribution of grants and leave the administration and oversight to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation staff. A Family Affiliated Fund can be established with a minimum gift of \$500,000. Albers Family Affiliated Fund

(2006) Both graduates of John Marshall High School, Paul and Leigh Ann Albers returned to Oklahoma City in 2007. After graduating from West Point in 1972 Paul was involved in military and other government service for many years, much of the time overseas. In 1991, he and two former colleagues founded a defense technology and homeland security oriented company that within 15 years grew to have over 500 employees. Leigh Ann graduated from the College of Nursing at the University of Oklahoma in 1978 and was active in nursing in Oklahoma City until 1995 when she and Paul were married. Paul's company was acquired by a large defense contractor in late 2006. The couple established the Albers Family Affiliated Fund to support organizations and causes important to their family. The first grant from the fund established the Donald Albers M.D. Endowed Chair at the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine, Department of Urology, to honor and recognize Paul's father. Dr. Albers practiced in Oklahoma City and was an adjunct faculty member at the college.

Bob & Nancy Anthony Family Affiliated Fund

(1999) When Nancy Anthony joined the Oklahoma City Community Foundation as Executive Director in 1985, she and her husband Bob established an advised fund. They added to it each year and established additional funds for their four daughters, Elizabeth, Christine, Suzanne and Katie B., as each one reached high school. With an additional gift in 1999, the funds were combined to create the Anthony Family Affiliated Fund that continues the family's charitable interests and allows their daughters to experience charitable giving and civic responsibility firsthand.

William E. & Margaret H. Davis Family Affiliated Fund

(1987) Bill and Margaret Davis founded the William E. Davis and Sons food distribution business in the 1950s as a family enterprise and it remained so until it was sold in 1986. All six of the Davis children were involved in the business's management and development. The family established the William E. and Margaret H. Davis Family Affiliated Fund in 1987 to continue the family's tradition of supporting local charities and causes. The fund was the first Affiliated Fund established at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Since that time it has distributed more than \$1 million in charitable gifts.

The Everett Family Affiliated Fund Foundation

(1993) Dr. Mark Allen Everett established a private foundation in 1960 to support his passion for the arts in Oklahoma. In 1993, Dr. Everett moved the private foundation to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, continuing to support the arts, dance scholarships and music programs which he started at several local arts agencies and universities. Dr. Everett, a retired professor at the University of Oklahoma (OU) College of Medicine, also established the Mark R. Everett Scholarship for the benefit of a medical student in honor of his father, the former dean of the college, and the Alice Everett Cello Scholarship in honor of his mother. The couple is pictured at right in 1946. In addition, Dr. Everett used assets of a charitable remainder trust to create a fund in memory of Michael Adam Everett to assist in the education and treatment of youth with serious mental disorders. Although Dr. Everett died in 2006, his charitable legacy will continue to support his motto of "having fun doing good."

Robert D. & Blanche H. Gordon Family Affiliated Fund

(1993) Robert Gordon graduated from Cornell University with a degree in petroleum geology and served in the U.S. Army during World War II. The Gordons moved to Oklahoma City in 1950 with the Ashland Oil Co., where Mr. Gordon served in positions from junior geologist to vice president until 1976 when he retired and became an independent petroleum geologist. The Gordon Family Affiliated Fund supports religious, educational and social service organizations in which Bob, Blanche and their children, Holly and Peggy, have a long-term interest.

Raymond H. & Bonnie B. Hefner Family Affiliated Fund

(1998) Raymond Hefner was born in Frederick, Okla. He served in the U.S. Coast Guard, graduated from Blackwood College and became a Certified Public Accountant. In 1950, he joined the Kirkpatrick Oil Company as one of its first employees. In 1957, Raymond and his wife Bonnie formed Bonray Oil Company and began a lifetime involvement in the oil and gas industry in both Oklahoma and on the national level. Mr. Hefner was a Trustee and Treasurer of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Prior to Mr. Hefner's death in 2001, the couple and their children, Vici Heitzke, Brenda Baldwin and Richard Hefner, established the fund to support their charitable interests, including aiding young people in their development toward becoming productive adults.

John & Claudia Holliman Affiliated Fund

(1997) John and Claudia Holliman view the world as their community. So when the couple talks about enriching the social, cultural and educational opportunities for their neighbors, they think on a global level. In 1996, Claudia, an attorney and Smith Barney Financial Advisor, and John, a Professor of Pathology at the OU Health Sciences Center, established the John and Claudia Holliman Affiliated Fund. Through their fund, the couple recommends grants to support a wide variety of projects and programs ranging from women's rights groups in third world countries, animal rescue organizations across the United States and the music and programs of the Oklahoma City Philharmonic. "Our fund gives us so much pleasure," Claudia explains. "We are able to focus on supporting the groups we want without having to worry about the administrative details. It really is a simple and easy way to make a visible impact on the causes about which you are passionate." "Charitable gifting has brought us much joy for many years." John continues, "Through our fund, we expect to enjoy this pleasure for the rest of our lives."

As president of the Kirkpatrick Family Fund, the largest affiliated fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Mr. Keesee helps to support areas of interest his family has supported for years. In addition, he served as a Trustee of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation and chairman of the Margaret Annis Boys Trust. With the creation of his own affiliated fund, Mr. Keesee will continue to support his charitable interests in the arts, animal welfare and education.

Love Family Affiliated Fund

(1999) Tom and Judy Love leased an abandoned filling station in western Oklahoma and began selling self-service gasoline in 1964. From these humble beginnings, Love's Travel Stops & Country Stores is now a major presence along America's highways and in smaller communities, employing nearly 6,000 people in 33 states. The Love Family Affiliated Fund was established by the couple in 1999 to support their charitable goals and to involve their four grown children in these activities. The Love Family Affiliated Fund is an important benefactor of many Oklahoma City charities.

Malzahn Family Affiliated Fund

(1992) The fund was established in 1991 by Ed and Mary Malzahn to benefit Perry, Okla. With the help of his father, who operated a welding and machine shop, Ed developed a trenching machine which is now known by its trade name, Ditch Witch. Fifty years later, Ditch Witch equipment, designed and manufactured in Perry, is used worldwide. The Malzahn Family Affiliated Fund, which includes the Malzahn children, Don, Pam and Leasa, continues the family's tradition of generosity and civic responsibility.

Janice & Joe L. Singer Family Affiliated Fund

(2004) In the 1960s, Joe Singer and his brother Alex formed Singer Brothers, a successful oil company that remains in business today. Mr. Singer was an active participant in all aspects of community life in Oklahoma City. During his lifetime, he served on several boards and was president of the Oklahoma City Jewish Community Foundation at the time of his death. For 46 years, Janice has remained an active member of Emanuel Synagogue and Emanuel Sisterhood. She is a past board member of the Jewish Federation of Oklahoma City and currently serves on the board of the Oklahoma City Jewish Community Foundation. Shortly before Joe's death in 2004, the couple established the Singer Family Affiliated Fund to perpetuate their support of charities within the community.

Benefactors



Individuals, families and businesses that have made cumulative contributions of \$10,000 or more are considered Benefactors. These donors have used a variety of assets including cash, oil or gas royalties, closely held stock and life insurance to make gifts to charitable organization endowment funds or to establish advised funds. 

Working alongside his father, Harold, at Stock Yards Bank, Mr. Empie was also an enthusiastic pilot. In 1942 he and a friend headed to Miami, Fla. and hired on with Pan American Air Ferries, a company that contracted with the government to ferry military planes from factories to worldwide military bases. Mr. Empie flew to Tehran, Egypt, South America and across the south Atlantic and South Africa. He was drafted by the Air Force during World War II and earned a commission as 2nd Lieutenant.

Once home, he received his law degree from Oklahoma City University. He was called back into active duty during the Korean conflict and served as Adjutant General for the 80th Air Depot Wing while stationed in South Africa. He resumed his work with the bank, eventually serving as president and CEO. He also served eight years as the state's Bank Commissioner. His love of flying never faltered, and he was the proud owner of three airplanes which he flew throughout the United States and Canada. An active philanthropist, Mr. Empie and his first wife, Kathryn, made gifts to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation that supported donor advised distributions. Mr. Empie died in June of 2008.

Mr. Hall lived just long enough to see his dream of providing the public, free of charge, the tools that had helped him move through his illness with a calm dignity and a quiet mind. Today, the center houses more than 2,500 books, videos and DVDs, offers a speakers' bureau, educational programs for physicians and mental health professionals and public workshops. All thanks to one man's vision and dream. The James L. and Carol M. Hall Family Fund was established prior to his death and continues to support the center through donor advised distributions.

The Mary Mahoney Memorial Health Center renamed its medical wing the Klaassen Medical Clinic, and he received the "Keepers of the Dream" award for exemplifying and making Dr. Martin Luther King's dream a reality in Oklahoma. A passionate musician who was a member of the Canterbury Choral Society for more than 30 years, Dr. Klaassen also volunteered as a church music leader. Dr. Klaassen and his wife Jeanie helped to create the charitable organization endowment fund for the Mary Mahoney Memorial Health Center in 1999.

Dr. Gary M. Moore




Lucyl Shirk

Following the philosophy "community service is the rent you pay for your time on earth," Mrs. Shirk established an advised fund in memory of her mother, Carrie Shirk, at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. 

Don Lippert

A love of God, family and community provided the foundation for Don Lippert's life. A Classen High School graduate, he served as a seaman first class under the command of Gen. Douglas MacArthur during the reconstruction of Japan. Following his military service, he earned a civil engineering degree from Oklahoma State University and joined Lippert Brothers Inc., a company founded in 1920 by his father and uncle. His career in the building industry spanned 40 years and many of his Oklahoma City projects remain construction icons including the Myriad Botanical Gardens Bridge.

Charter members of the Messiah Lutheran Church, Don and his wife Martha spent time as missionaries in Poland with Lutheran Hour Ministries. He loved the outdoors and especially enjoyed camping and skiing with his five children in Colorado and sailing with his wife. A world traveler, Don was a loyal Oklahoma State fan and scheduled his trips abroad after football and basketball seasons had concluded. The Lipperts supported several charitable organizations both as a family and through the company. Following Don's death in March of 2008, a memorial fund was established at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation.



Distribution Committees

Distribution Committee Affiliated Funds are endowments that give donors the opportunity to stay actively involved in deciding the charitable beneficiaries of the funds' distributions while administrative services are handled by the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. This allows donors to avoid excise taxes and payout requirements involved with private foundations and instead focus their attention on charitable giving. Charitable Organization Endowments



The Oklahoma City Community Foundation is the area's specialist for endowment fund management and has long been the community's leading advocate for endowment development. We have created investment, distribution and administrative policies that are appropriate for long-term endowment growth. As of June 30, 2008, the market value of the Charitable Organization Endowment Program was \$133.4 million and distributions for the year will exceed \$5.45 million. The program has provided charitable organizations a way to build endowment funds for 39 years. Because of the wide support of many donors in the community, the leadership of John E. Kirkpatrick and the participation of so many organizations, our Charitable Organization Endowment Program is the largest of its kind among the more than 700 community foundations in the United States.

What is a Charitable Organization Endowment?

A charitable organization endowment is a permanent fund that generates annual income for a charitable organization. Our investment and distribution policies take into consideration that these funds need to provide income to the organizations for years to come. In addition to providing strong financial management, we also work directly with the organizations and donors to help build these funds.

Why an Endowment at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation?

Our Charitable Organization Endowment Program provides five key elements for an organization to further secure its long-term viability:

- 1. A single endowment fund into which many donors can contribute at any time to further establish and build permanent support. The Oklahoma City Community Foundation is able to accept many types of marketable assets as charitable gifts including on-line gifts through www.occf.org.
- 2. A stable annual cash distribution that allows staff to rely upon a steady and predictable income stream from the endowment fund as it relates to the organization's budget.
- 3. The long-term investment strategies and efficient management of the funds provides for the future financial needs of the organization. Endowment funds are pooled so small funds receive the same investment returns and management services as larger funds.
- 4. We serve as a partner with each charitable organization, its staff and board of directors to help build the endowment through planned giving services, training and educational workshops.
- 5. All charitable organization endowments are promoted and publicized to current and potential donors on a continual basis both via publications and Web site resources.

What is Required to Establish an Endowment Fund?

Any 501(c)(3) public charity organization approved by the Trustees may establish an endowment fund with us. An endowment can be started with a \$20,000 contribution from the organization itself or from a donor or group of donors.

Services for Charitable Organization Endowments

In addition to providing strong financial management, we also provide the organizations online access to fund information, operational opportunities through grant and development programs, and ongoing promotion of their organization's endowment to current and potential donors.

John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge

As part of the celebration of the 100th anniversary of our founder, John Kirkpatrick's birth, the Kirkpatrick Family Fund and the Oklahoma City Community Foundation offered the John Kirkpatrick Centennial

Endowment Challenge, a matching grant program for charitable organizations and scholarship endowment funds who wished to participate. For more information on the Challenge, please see page 71.

Community Programs and Grants

Capacity Building grants provide funding opportunities to organizations to assist with long-range planning, staff and board training, technology needs, program expansion and development and first-time audits. In addition, roundtable meetings are held throughout the year and offer free training opportunities, updates on relevant issues and serve as an avenue to discuss common charitable organization issues. In partnership with Cole & Reed, P.C., we offer a series of lunchtime workshops for certified public accountants who work for or with charitable organizations. The workshops are free and provide two hours of continuing education credit for the attendees.

Development and Communications

In addition to the Annual Report, we also publish the Charitable Organization Endowment Report and distribute it to all donors, potential donors and community leaders. The report lists all charitable organization endowments and is an effective marketing tool used to encourage gifts to the funds.

DonorCentral

DonorCentral is a secure online reporting service made available to representatives of each charitable organization endowment. DonorCentral allows the staff and board of directors to view current fund balances, financial statements and gift history online.

Our Web site has several key features that benefit the charitable organization endowments:

Central Oklahoma Charities is the area's most up-to-date searchable online nonprofit resource directory. Each charitable organization endowment is included in both an alphabetical listing as well as a categorical index and each listing includes all contact information, a description of services and a link to the organization's Web site and e-mail.

Our secure online giving service offers donors the ease of using a VISA, MasterCard or American Express to make a gift to any of the charitable organization endowments. A link for online gifts is listed on each of the charitable organization pages in Central Oklahoma Charities.

Charitable Organization Endowment Program Notebooks

A customized Charitable Organization Endowment Program Notebook to each of the charitable organizations. The notebooks contain historical information on gifts and grants, policies governing the fund along with the fund agreement, a copy of the first four custom pages of the fund report and details about services we provide.





Jazz in June

The city of Norman's annual Jazz in June has been bringing the smooth sounds of jazz and blues to the town since 1983. During the three-day festival, concerts featuring local, regional and national artists draw crowds of up to 50,000. The event also includes educational workshops featuring the master musicians appearing in the festival.

Jazz in June established a charitable organization endowment at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation in 2007. The organizers are reinvesting the annual distribution back into the endowment with the intent to grow the fund so that future distributions can be used to help underwrite the event. Jazz in June encouraged additional gifts to the endowment by participating in the John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge during 2008.


Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation -Fleming Scholarship

Since 1956, students receiving the Sir Alexander Fleming Scholar award have participated in an eight-week resident program at Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation (OMRF) where they work with scientist mentors. The students, who must have graduated from an Oklahoma high school, are required to complete a research project that relates to what their mentor's lab is currently working on. Annual distributions from the charitable organization endowment support the scholarships.

"My Fleming Scholar experience taught me that science is really something special," says Dr. Rodger McEver, the 1965 Fleming Scholar and now program chair of OMRF Cardiovascular Biology Research Program. "Now, after having mentored scholars in my own lab, it's clear that in them, you see the future. You see young people who have so much promise using this opportunity to take them to new places, pick up where you leave off and go to higher levels. It's a very special relationship and one of our obligations as scientists to help those who will lead in the future."

The award is named for the Nobel prizewinning scientist who discovered penicillin and invented the penicillin vaccine. Sir Fleming visited Oklahoma City in 1949 to dedicate the first OMRF building.





45th Infantry Division Museum

Since 1976, the 45th Infantry Division Museum has been bringing to life the military history of America, specifically the history of Oklahomans in the military. A favorite visiting place for teaching history to school children, the museum is the largest state-operated military history museum in the nation. Housing one of the largest collections of American military firearms in the nation as well as the world's largest collection of Pulitzer prize-winning artist Bill Mauldin's "Willy and Joe" cartoons, the museum attracts visitors from all over the globe.

In 1984, the museum established a charitable organization endowment fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Each annual distribution is reinvested back into the endowment so that in the future, the distribution can be used toward museum operations. The 45th Infantry Division Museum also participated in the John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge during 2008.

Oklahoma City/County Historical Society

The Oklahoma City/County Historical Society was formed in 1977 to preserve the history and artifacts of the area and to provide information and education about the history of Oklahoma County by working with schools and various groups. The society maintains large archives of photos, artifacts and historical documents as it works to preserve the past.

The society established a charitable organization endowment fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation in 1979. Each annual distribution from the endowment has been re-invested in the fund in order to increase the endowment as much as possible with the intent that one day the distribution will support operating and administrative costs. The organization participated in the John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge in 2008 to encourage donors to contribute to the endowment.





Chesapeake Swim Club

Founded in 1956, the Chesapeake Swim Club offers a well rounded, competitive swimming program for young people of all ages and ability levels. From 1963 until 2007, the club was fortunate to be sponsored by the Kerr McGee Corporation and was known as the Kerr McGee Swim Club for 44 years. In 2007 Chesapeake Energy became the club's new sponsor. The club works with more than 400 swimmers year round between the ages of five and 22 years old. Instructors provide seven levels of professional training and instruction at three locations in the metropolitan area. The instruction combined with dedicated and talented swimmers has earned the club the title of Oklahoma Swimming Champions for 10 consecutive years. The annual distribution from the Chesapeake Swim Club's charitable organization endowment fund, established in 1988, is used to sponsor lower-income kids in the program, to help meet the cost of pool rentals, send staff members to competitions with the swimmers and to supplement the cost of an annual swim meet trip. The distribution also helps cover expenses of coaches attending educational conferences throughout the year. Participation in the John Kirkpatrick Centennial Challenge during 2008 encouraged supporters of the club to make gifts to the endowment fund.

National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum

The National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum is America's premier institution of Western history, art and culture. Founded in Oklahoma City in 1955, the museum collects, preserves and exhibits an internationally renowned collection of Western art and artifacts while sponsoring dynamic educational programs and ground-breaking scholarly research to stimulate interest in the enduring legacy of our American West. In 1970, Oklahoma City banker Jasper D. Ackerman made a gift of \$25,000 to establish an endowment for the museum. His gift to create a fund to benefit a specific organization was the first of its type to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation and initiated what is today the largest charitable organization endowment program in the country with 285 participants. He later left a \$200,000 bequest to benefit the fund. In 1991, the fund became an affiliated fund.



Field of Interest Funds

A Field of Interest Fund allows a donor to support a specific area of charitable interest. Once established, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation Trustees administer the fund to meet the current needs and concerns that fall within that charitable interest. Variety Health Center

A \$15,000 grant from funds related to access to health care was awarded to the Variety Health Center to provide a part-time registered pediatric dietician at its Lafayette Health Clinic in south Oklahoma City. The dietician provides nutrition counseling to both underweight and overweight children and parents, including the understanding of nutrition labels and proper food portions to encourage a healthy, balanced diet.

W.H. Crocus Seeing Eye Dog Fund

(1998) In the office building where an anonymous donor worked, a blind man and his Seeing Eye dog would pass him in the hall every day. The donor came to admire the trusting relationship between the man and his dog and established a fund to help visually impaired individuals secure Seeing Eye dogs. The fund is named for the first Seeing Eye dog sponsored through the fund.

Embassy of Korea

(1975) While serving as honorary consul for the Embassy of Korea in Oklahoma City, John Kirkpatrick received a \$1,000 check from the Ambassador of Korea to support special program activities in the Oklahoma City area. Mr. Kirkpatrick donated this check and many subsequent checks to establish this fund that supports Korean and other Asian cultural activities throughout the community.

Forward Oklahoma

(1997) In the early 1980s, a group of young businessmen who wanted to enhance metropolitan Oklahoma City launched an aggressive economic development program. When the group's core members moved on to other projects, an endowment fund was established with the remaining assets. Distributions from the fund continue to support the economic development of Oklahoma City.

Hospitals and Health Care

(1971) The fund promotes health care services through grants to organizations that provide direct services such as indigent care, prescription drugs, eyeglasses, medical exams and dental care.

Florida M. Knight Trust

(1975) This fund receives and distributes the earnings of the Florida M. Knight Trust. Mrs. Knight was a local businesswoman in the 1930s who left a downtown building to the original trust. While the building is gone and her family no longer lives here, the Florida M. Knight Trust supports grants to improve the quality of life of handicapped and disabled children in the Oklahoma City area.

Lillian Frances Watts Meador

(1996) William Meador of Columbus, Ohio, established a fund in memory of his mother who loved both flowers and Oklahoma City. The earnings are used to purchase and plant hyacinth bulbs in public parks and lands and are distributed through the Margaret Annis Boys Trust grant program.

Medical Research Funds

(1986) The Oklahoma City Community Foundation has received a number of gifts to establish funds for various medical research areas. In order to have a greater impact on medical science, each year we cooperate with the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine Alumni Association, the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation and other groups to fund research projects at those institutions. Separate funds are maintained in the following areas: Allergy Research, Arthritis Research, Diabetes Research, Heart Disease Research and Parkinson's Disease Research.

Oklahoma City Opera Association

(1970) In the late 1960s, the Oklahoma City Opera Association sponsored opera performances. At its final meeting, the association used its remaining assets to establish an endowment.

Tinker Air Force Base - General's Fund

(1988) Established by John Kirkpatrick to support the special needs of those serving on the base.

Daily Living Centers

An \$8,000 grant from funds related to elderly services was awarded to the Daily Living Centers to hire a part-time driver to provide transportation to doctor appointments and for essential shopping. Daily Living Centers operates three locations in the Oklahoma City area that provide therapeutic day programs for adults with chronic and mental health problems.



Dean Wild

Dean Wild was a man who saw possibilities in everyone he encountered. The historic Oklahoma high school coach made his mark in 1956, when he integrated his Frederick High School football team a full 10 years before Frederick schools integrated. His Bombers went 14-0 and became the first integrated team to win the state championship, outscoring opponents 553-26 over the season. The team was inducted in 2007 into the Oklahoma Sports Hall of Fame as a Team of Legend.

Born in 1912 on a homestead farm near Granite, Oklahoma, Mr. Wild served four years in the Army Air Force as an instructor and gunnery officer, and later graduated from Southwestern Oklahoma State Teacher's College, where he lettered in football and baseball. After graduation he began a coaching career that would last more than 30 years until he was hired as assistant principal of Putnam City West High School. During his tenure, he worked hard to promote school spirit and believed no school could be successful without good morale.

"He was the epitome of fairness," said Brian Dougherty, a 1975 graduate. "When a kid had issues or was going down the wrong path, he would pull them in, talk, and figure it out. He was instrumental in turning many kids around and was incredibly firm, fair and frank."

Mr. Wild was recognized for his leadership many times, including a 1968 induction into the Oklahoma Coaches Hall of Fame. Following his death in January of 2008 at the age of 95, Mildred, his wife of 69 years, established a scholarship fund in her husband's memory. See listing on page 63.

Mildred Young

To the Mahone children, growing up in Hobart, Oklahoma would not have been the same without Mildred "Mildro" and William Young in their lives. With three sons and one daughter under the age of four, the Mahone family hired Mrs. Young to assist with running the household. Soon, she became like a second mother to the children and taught them many life lessons that they carry with them today. The couple had lost their spouses to illness and married one another when they were in their 70s. Mr. Young died in 1998 and Mrs. Young in 1999. Mr. Young was the principal of the blacks-only high school in Hobart and joined the Hobart High School faculty when the school integrated in 1955. At the time, he was the only black teacher on the faculty. Believing in being educated and well read, Mrs. Young decided while in her 60s to finish her education and she earned her GED.

The Mahone children and their parents established the scholarship fund to honor and memorialize two people who made a difference in all of their lives and in the Hobart community. "They both were extremely humble folks and probably would be embarrassed by us wanting to do this," says Molly Mahone Holder. "But we had to. They loved Hobart and our family unconditionally."

Edgemere Park Preservation Area

Edgemere Park Preservation Area was formed in 1973 to preserve the historic character of the neighborhood while making improvements that are compatible with the area's history. Built in the late 1920s and known for both its architectural style and the civic leaders who lived in the neighborhood, Edgemere Park was the third neighborhood to receive designation as a Historic Preservation District from the City of Oklahoma City. The area is also listed in the National Register of Historic Places. About 180 members work continuously to maintain the park.

In 2002, the group established a charitable organization endowment fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. The annual distribution from the fund is used for park maintenance such as cleaning the park following the 2007 ice storm. The endowment received a grant from an advised fund during fiscal year 2008.

Ms. Kirkpatrick's influence is visible in other grants made by the Kirkpatrick Family Fund to support educational programs to improve animal adoption rates and spay/neuter programs to reduce overpopulation. Additionally, grants have helped to improve shelter and sanctuary environments where animals recover their health, await adoption or humanely live out their lives.

Over the last several years the Kirkpatrick Family Fund has supported a network of animal rescue and shelter organizations through the formation of the Metropolitan Alliance for Animal Life. This public/private

network is focused on how these different organizations work together to reduce and ultimately eliminate the euthanasia of healthy dogs and cats in central Oklahoma. The Kirkpatrick Family Fund has supported the formation of the Humane Society of Central Oklahoma. Working in partnership with the Oklahoma City Animal Shelter the two organizations have begun implementing programs that address dog and cat overpopulation, improve adoption rates plus educate and advocate for the humane treatment of animals. Grants to national organizations including the Humane Society of the United States and the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals provide valuable professional development and training for local shelters and rescue organizations, law enforcement, lawyers and judges responsible for the enforcement of state and federal law in Oklahoma.

The Kirkpatrick Family Fund thanks Joan Kirkpatrick for her interest and knowledge which guides our grant making decisions related to animal issues.

The Kirkpatrick Family Fund is responsible for supporting the mission and programs of many nonprofits primarily in central Oklahoma through grant programs described in detail at KirkpatrickFamilyFund.org. The following is an overview of the fiscal year 2008 Large Grants.

Central Oklahoma Humane Society

With the assistance of a grant from the Kirkpatrick Family Fund, the Central Oklahoma Humane Society was able to open a new pet adoption center in north Oklahoma City. The \$100,000 grant allowed the organization to renovate a pre-existing building. At the center, not only are individuals and families able to interact with homeless dogs and pets, they can also shop at a pet supply store. The proceeds from sales will be used to maintain the facility. The new center also allows the organization to host animal humane education classes for children. With the new center, the organization expects to increase its annual adoptions from 1,000 to 1,500.



John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge





John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge

In 1979, John E. Kirkpatrick offered the first of seven dollar-for-dollar challenge matches to charitable organizations as a way to build their endowments at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation and attract new donors. The "Kirkpatrick Challenges" as they became known would become a hallmark of his philanthropy.

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation's Charitable Organization Endowment Program is the largest of its kind in the United States and there is only one explanation for this distinction: the vision of John E. Kirkpatrick.

In 1969, John E. Kirkpatrick provided the leadership to start the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. In doing so, he gave donors an opportunity to create charitable funds for the benefit of the community. After several years he realized that many donors might prefer to contribute to funds that supported specific organizations more than just a broad-based community fund. Additionally, he felt that endowments for charitable organizations would provide a reliable and stable source of income when combined with good investment oversight and protected from invasion.

These two motivations initiated one of the most significant philanthropic activities in Oklahoma City over the past 40 years. First started in 1979, the Kirkpatrick Challenge invited charitable organizations with endowments to solicit contributions to their funds over a set period of time with the guarantee that each dollar would be "matched" by Mr. Kirkpatrick. Over the next 20 years there would be a total of seven similar "Kirkpatrick Challenges" that would become a hallmark of his philanthropy. In all, these challenges and the resulting investment appreciation netted more than \$58 million to more than 230 organizations and attracted more than 6,000 new donors.

As part of the celebration of the 100th anniversary of Mr. Kirkpatrick's birth, his grandson Chris Keesee, the Kirkpatrick Family Fund and the Oklahoma City Community Foundation in 2008 initiated the John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge, a matching grant opportunity for charitable organizations and scholarship endowment funds. Those endowments participating in the Challenge will receive a dollar-for-dollar matching grant of up to \$5,000 for contributions made to their funds at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation between February 1, 2008 and December 31, 2008. The Challenge is a great opportunity for donors to double the value of a gift to one or more endowment funds. The 100th Birthday Celebration Challenge was a complementary initiative of the Kirkpatrick Family Fund and offered a group of larger matches to 23 organizations with specific endowment building plans. The total potential matching grants for both these efforts is more than \$3 million.

Mr. Kirkpatrick liked the idea of others participating in his projects and that's why he supported the Kirkpatrick Challenges. It made his money go further and it also attracted other people to be invested in the effort. While his death in October of 2006 ended his personal involvement with philanthropy, the John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge carries on his legacy of giving back to our community.

Community Programs

Community Programs is a leadership effort that identifies issues, brings together partner organizations and works to find resources to generate the needed services. Community Programs takes a pro-active approach to defining community opportunities and working with other organizations to develop and fund programs that benefit the whole community in a way that has real impact. Community Programs are focused, opportunity-based, and operate on a community-wide level, with strong and involved community partners whose action agenda emphasizes short-term results and long-term impact. By focusing on a specific opportunity, we are able to develop a base of knowledge about the issue, devote staff resources to needed

collaboration and coordination efforts, follow the development of a program over a period of time and develop the programs and partnerships that are required for new services to be maintained. Projects funded through these focus areas are stronger because we understand the underlying challenges and look for sustainable solutions. The Fund for Oklahoma City, a compilation of unrestricted funds, is the primary funding source for Community Programs. It also supports new services and programs that meet a broader need of the community.

Community Programs includes five specific program areas:

Capacity Building offers resources to strengthen the administrative infrastructure and management of the 285 charitable organizations with endowments at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. In fiscal year 2008, Capacity Building helped to build and enhance those endowments through staff support of development efforts and timely information and resources, free roundtable luncheons, free continuing education workshops, web-based resources and other services.

LIFE (Literacy Is For Everyone) addresses literacy issues within the community, including English as a second language. In fiscal year 2008, LIFE was instrumental in the forming of the Oklahoma City Metro Literacy Coalition. LIFE also worked with medical clinics to ensure easier navigation and comprehension for those with low literacy levels, and assisted in the research for the Status of Literacy in Oklahoma City Report.

Healthy Lifestyles Initiative promotes and encourages everyone in central Oklahoma to be physically active and to understand the longterm health benefits of exercise. In fiscal year 2008, Healthy Lifestyles motivated thousands of people to add physical activity into their daily lifestyle by walking every day.

Margaret Annis Boys Trust/Parks and Public Spaces Initiative supports beautification of parks and public spaces within central Oklahoma with an emphasis on simple and sustainable landscape improvements. In fiscal year 2008, the program reached out to the community through free seminars and technical expertise as well as improved landscaping on public lands.

The Trustee Scholarship Initiative encourages more high school students in central Oklahoma to seek higher education after graduation. The initiative was created in 1998 to promote higher education as an option for any student in central Oklahoma who is eligible and has the desire to pursue it. In fiscal year 2008, hundreds of students received scholarships, and their quidance counselors across central Oklahoma broadened their knowledge of college admissions requirements and other relevant issues through the Central Oklahoma Guidance Counselor Network.

A basic goal of Community Programs is to develop solutions to improve our community through effective programs and projects. Our Community Programs staff helps coordinate the work of different organizations working on similar issues, leverage resources to maximize the impact and provide leadership to the community in these focus areas. During fiscal year 2008, Community Programs grants totaling \$588,394 were awarded to organizations. For a complete list of Community Programs grants, please see pages 78-79.

Fund for Oklahoma City



The Fund for Oklahoma City is comprised of a group of unrestricted funds gifted by individuals who recognized the need to have flexible resources to respond to the ever-changing needs of the community.

The Fund for Oklahoma City is the collection of unrestricted gifts which are available to support the mission of "meeting the changing needs of the community."

Earnings from these discretionary funds provide support for staff who lead the focus area initiatives, for programs that provide education and training to a wide range of charitable organizations, for facilities and technical support, and for specific grant programs that are targeted to the focus area goals.

Skyline Urban Ministry

Skyline Urban Ministry's OKC Jets is a year-round program for children grades I-5 available free of charge. Jets offers both after school programs as well as summer academies. A Fund for Oklahoma City grant helped the organization establish a new Jets location at Epworth United Methodist Church. The new program kicked off in the summer with a four-week academy where the children learned about different world cultures. The Epworth location's after school programming is for students attending Eugene Fields Elementary School.



Oklahoma City Museum of Art

The Oklahoma City Museum of Art was the final North American venue for Roman Art from the Louvre, an unprecedented exhibition of ancient masterworks, drawn from the Louvre's unparalleled collection.

Organized by the American Federation of Arts and the Musée du Louvre, and selected by Daniel Roger and Cécile Giroire, curators in the Greek, Etruscan, and Roman Antiquities Department at the Louvre, the exhibition featured masterworks that highlight the diversity of artistic production that characterizes Roman art. The 184 pieces date from the early first century B.C. to the 6th century A.D. and included are a variety of monumental sculptures, sarcophagi, marble busts and reliefs, bronze and terracotta statuettes and implements, jewelry, glass and metal cups and vessels, mosaics, fresco paintings and a cache of more than one hundred major silver pieces from Pompeii. A Fund for Oklahoma City grant allowed the museum to develop a media-based interpretive and educational initiative that debuted during the Roman Art exhibition.

Capacity Building Program

The purpose of the Capacity Building Program is to support the charitable organizations participating in the Charitable Organization Endowment Program by strengthening their administrative infrastructure and increasing their efficiency and effectiveness. The program provides grants, web-based resources, free roundtables and workshops to the 285 organizations with endowment funds at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. In fiscal year 2008, 10 new organizations started charitable organization endowment funds, and several with existing endowment funds established new sub-funds. Girl Scouts-Western Oklahoma

In March of 2008, two central Oklahoma Girl Scout councils merged to create the Girl Scouts-Western Oklahoma. The new organization was awarded a \$4,000 Capacity Building grant to assist with the realignment of services. Girl Scouts-Western Oklahoma serves 39 counties. Throughout the year, we also host free roundtable luncheons for the staff of the organizations, providing an opportunity for them to learn about pertinent issues and programs related to nonprofit and board management, technology, marketing, donor outreach and human resources. In fiscal year 2008, roundtable topics included program evaluation and reporting, identifying potential funding, strategic planning, major donors and dashboard reports, among others.

In addition to the roundtables, in fiscal year 2008 we continued to coordinate five Lunch for 2 seminars, a series of free continuing education workshops for the certified public accountants who work for and with the organizations with charitable endowments. The workshops are held in partnership with Cole & Reed PC and focus on compliance and tax topics, while also providing attendees with two hours of CE credit for each meeting.

Our Web site offers several key features that highlight and help the charitable organization endowments at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Central Oklahoma Charities is the area's most up-to-date, searchable online nonprofit resource directory. Each organization's name serves as a link that goes directly to a Web page that includes all contact information, a description of services, a link to make an online contribution, and a link to the organization's Web site and email address.

In fiscal year 2008, more than 100 online gifts were made to charitable organization endowments through Central Oklahoma Charities.

Charitable organization endowments also receive the benefit of immediate access to their fund information through DonorCentral, a secure online reporting source that allows representatives of each endowment to view fund balances, financial statements and giving history.

As part of the celebration of the 100th anniversary of founder John Kirkpatrick's birth, the Kirkpatrick Family Fund and the Oklahoma City Community Foundation offered the John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge, a matching grant program for charitable organizations and scholarship funds who wished to participate. Through the Challenge, we offered a dollar-for-dollar matching grant of up to \$5,000 for contributions made to the organization's endowment between February 1, 2008 and December 31, 2008 – a possible \$10,000 increase to each fund. The Kirkpatrick Family Fund offered a large match opportunity to 23 charities that had specific endowment building goals and plans.

In addition, we promote all of the charitable organizations with endowments through the publication of the annual COE newsletter, which is mailed to more than 15,000 people and used as a development tool with potential donors.

Literacy Is For Everyone



According to the Oklahoma City Metro Literacy Coalition, nearly 140,000 adults in Oklahoma County have limited literacy skills; they have difficulty reading a newspaper, filling out a job application or accessing and understanding health care information. Individuals reading at such lower levels are often intimidated by their limited skills and are hesitant to ask for help.



Oklahoma Christian University

A LIFE grant helped the Oklahoma Christian University's Lunch Time Learning Series expand its literacy programming to several Oklahoma City area hotels where tutors are teaching English to hotel employees.



To provide information about literacy resources, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation maintains www.ReadOKC.org, a Web site directory of 19 service providers in the metropolitan area. A Spanish version of the Web site is available at www.ReadOKC.org/Espanol.

The Literacy Is For Everyone (LIFE) Initiative at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation is beginning its fourth year of providing support to literacy organizations as they work to address illiteracy in our community. The LIFE Initiative goal is to give all individuals the chance to speak and learn English at a level that allows them to be economically independent. Because of these efforts, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation is seen as a resource for information as well as a pro-active partner in the literacy area.

LIFE also works closely with providers to create a community strategy to combat illiteracy and to encourage collaboration among literacy organizations. Along with community partners, LIFE's program officer, Mary Surbeck, worked to create the task forces from which the Oklahoma City Metro Literacy Coalition was formed in 2007.

Staff assisted the coalition in researching for the Status of Literacy in Oklahoma City Report, which was published in May of 2008 and which not only reported on current illiteracy trends and problems but also outlined a community plan to raise literacy levels. Through relationships with literacy organizations and providers, LIFE helps to form a network of resources as the community addresses the literacy problem.

In February 2008, LIFE hosted a health literacy program, working with medical providers on methods they can use to help those with low literacy skills navigate the system and to encourage those clients to seek literacy help. The program also addressed coordinating the readability and consistency of clinic materials, striving to simplify and consolidate the look and content of signs, publications and medication labels. In fiscal year 2008, LIFE also coordinated a hospital tour for literacy providers, to study hospital access and navigability for low literacy patients.

LIFE grants are awarded to provide funding for training, materials, awareness-building and administrative support to help improve the capacity of existing programs and widen the outreach of literacy providers. A grant from the Healthy Lifestyles Initiative assisted the Langston University Extension office in Oklahoma City to launch a Rope Skipping and Double Dutch (RSDD) physical fitness initiative to benefit at risk youth in northeast Oklahoma City.

The Healthy Lifestyles Initiative works to move people beyond awareness of the need to change health habits to actively engaging them in physical activity programs. We raise awareness of the connection between good health and exercise through working with community partners who address health care and social issues. Also, individuals logging on to www.occf. org can find helpful resources on healthy living and exercise, as well as Great Places to Walk, a detailed list of nearly 20 walking trail sites in the metropolitan area.

In February 2008, staff members of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation joined in the quest for better health with our own employee wellness efforts. Once a month, professionals from the health care field present lunch-and-learn programs covering multiple aspects of fitness, healthy living, nutrition and related topics. The program kicked off with free health screenings for employees and their families, including cholesterol tests, bone density screenings, body fat percentage and blood pressure. Employees used the test results to develop their own

healthy goals. As part of the Get Moving OKC! Reward Challenge, a staff team, appropriately called the "Fundering Herd," took part and began logging and recording weekly miles walked. A number of staff have seen significant improvements in weight loss, cholesterol, eating habits and overall health since the program began.

Get Moving OKC!



On April I, 2008, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation kicked off Get Moving OKC! — a I3-week walking program that challenged teams comprised of Oklahoma City area residents to improve their health through daily walking. Of the 72 teams who signed up, 69 completed the program. The nearly I,800 walkers on those teams logged 288,318 miles during the I3 weeks.



Nearly 200 walkers attended the April 1st kick-off event. Oklahoma City Mayor Mick Cornett led the teams on a two-mile walk down Broadway Avenue.

"We chose to focus on walking because it is the body's most natural form of exercise and is a great place to start creating a higher level of fitness and overall health," says Nancy B. Anthony, executive director of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. "The people we targeted are those who don't have access to fitness equipment or are put off by gyms but who desire to begin a healthy lifestyle. To say the least, we were thrilled with the response and outcome."

The program required that teams made up of adults 18 years or older committed to walking or running an average of at least two miles a day, five days a week, or a minimum of 10 miles a week. The reward? Each team that completed the challenge received \$100 per team member who successfully completed the 130-mile goal, up to a possible total of \$2,500 per team. The awarded funds were available to the teams' nonprofit organization or for whatever project they chose. In total, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation awarded approximately \$152,300 to teams for successful completion of the program.

"This is such a great thing," says Kathy Thomas, team leader for the Tinker Air Force Base employee team. "I have people I haven't been able to get into a walking program that are logging over 20 miles a week and one person has been able to get off medications for blood pressure and diabetes."

For the St. Jude Baptist Church's Saints On the Move team, in addition to reports of loss of weight and inches among the walkers, members are now encouraging co-workers, neighbors and family members to join them. "We are planning on continuing walking," says team leader Queen Spears. "We appreciate this opportunity and it's been an extra push we all needed."

Parks & Public Spaces Initiative/ Margaret Annis Boys Trust

The Margaret Annis Boys Trust and Parks & Public Spaces Initiative continues to renovate and rejuvenate public spaces by providing beautification guidance to a variety of projects. School grounds, public parks and medians and neighborhood entries all benefit from the advice and expertise offered by our staff, the training and technical advice available and the addition of trees, shrubs and other plant material.



Margaret Annis Boys Signature Project

The Bickham-Rudkin Park in Edmond received the first Margaret Annis Boys Signature Project grant. The park is the newest park in Edmond and also includes a dog park, walking trail and playground area. The Margaret Annis Boys Centennial Arboretum features 275 native trees and will be used to educate the public on proper tree selection, care and planting techniques. The arboretum is a joint project between The Tree Bank and the Edmond Parks Department.

To celebrate the 100th anniversary of Margaret Annis Boys' birthday in June 2009, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation established the Margaret Annis Boys Signature Project Program, which awards grants of up to \$50,000 for significant beautification projects in Oklahoma County parks and public lands. Chosen projects include exemplary landscaping and enhancement to an area that will be considered permanent improvements. In 2008, the first signature project grant was awarded to the Tree Bank and the City of Edmond to plant a 275-tree arboretum in Bickham-Rudkin Park.

A vital asset to the program is the expertise and technical assistance of Brian Dougherty, landscape architect, American Society of Landscape Architects Fellow and horticulturalist. Brian spends much of his time providing guidance and expertise to neighborhood associations and civic groups in central Oklahoma through direct hands-on consulting on landscaping projects and lectures on issues related to community improvement, such as beautification of public spaces like parks and medians. By offering Brian's considerable expertise to the community, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation's parks initiative adds immeasurable value not only to projects funded through the Boys Trust but also those funded through a wide range of other public resources. In March of 2008, Brian presented "You and Your Landscape," a free, open-to-the-public lecture dealing with common landscaping questions and problems, specifically addressing tree damage from the devastating December 2007 ice storm.

Since launching the Clean and Beautiful Schools program in 2001, we have worked with more than 130 central Oklahoma public and private elementary schools on campus exterior improvements, focusing on safety and function first, then making sure landscape additions are high impact and low maintenance. In 2008, two new elementary schools were added to the program – Ridgecrest Elementary in Midwest City and Prairie Queen Elementary in Oklahoma City. Clean and Beautiful Schools was initiated

by the Trustees to address the appearance of public lands through the maintenance, safety and beautification of school grounds. In fiscal year 2008, Westmoore High School's student council used the program to design a comprehensive campus landscape and improvement project.

Another important component of the Clean and Beautiful Schools program is support for grounds and maintenance workers at the schools through twice-yearly free maintenance workshops focusing on safety, proper use of equipment and grounds maintenance techniques. In 2008, the two workshops were held at the Will Rogers Park Exhibition Building and focused on successful ground maintenance techniques, tree and shrub pruning and overall tips for spring and summer. By supporting and training these staff, the Clean & Beautiful Schools program has developed friends and advocates at each school site to maintain the improvements.

In 1991, longtime elementary school teacher and principal Margaret Annis Boys left an estate bequest of \$1.5 million to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, for the specific purpose of beautifying parks, medians and public spaces. In the years since her gift, more than \$2 million has been distributed to fund 300 projects on public lands and non-profit lands.

Trustee Scholarship Initiative



In 1998, the Trustee Scholarship Initiative was founded to encourage more high school students in central Oklahoma to pursue higher education after graduation from high school. Since then, more than \$3 million has been committed by the Trustees to the initiative's five scholarship programs and to the Central Oklahoma Guidance Counselor Network, and more than 1,600 students have received scholarships through these programs.



In April, 95 Community Foundation Scholars, 82 Foundation of Promise Scholars, their parents and guidance counselors were recognized at a special luncheon.

In order to ensure that all students benefit from the Trustee Scholarship Initiative, the Central Oklahoma Guidance Counselor Network was formed to offer training and support for the high school counselors who provide college guidance at 48 public and independent high schools in Central Oklahoma. Through workshops and visits to college campuses, the network is an important resource for the counselors.

As an added incentive to participating in the program, each year at least one Community Foundation Scholar award is provided to each of the high schools whose guidance counselor participated in the activities. Larger schools receive up to three awards.

Community Foundation Scholars and Foundation of Promise Scholars

These two scholarship programs are available to students from 48 public and independent high schools in central Oklahoma.

Community Foundation Scholars are good students who are also good citizens – students who have an excellent school record but who might not qualify for the more competitive academic scholarships. In 2008, 95 students received Community Foundation Scholar awards of \$1,200 each.

Foundation of Promise Scholars are first-generation college students; those who will be the first in their family to attend college. To be eligible for the award, a first-generation student must apply to the program as a

junior and agree to complete specific activities to help prepare them for college admission, including a campus visit. In 2008, 82 students received Foundation of Promise Scholar awards of \$1,200 each.

Oklahoma Youth With Promise Scholars

The Oklahoma Youth With Promise program works with both private and public agencies to award scholarships to students who graduated from high school while in Oklahoma's foster care system. Recipients receive support from volunteer mentors in addition to scholarship funds. Most recently, 41 students were awarded scholarships through this program. Most students are eligible for support for their full four-year undergraduate program.

Non-Traditional Scholars

The goal of this program is to assist adults re-entering the educational system after work or military service. Working with several organizations, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation awards scholarships to adults who have completed one educational program and possess the desire and ability to advance to another program. The sponsoring organizations agree to provide mentoring support for the scholarship recipients.

Nurse Education Program

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation created the Nurse Education Program in 2003 in response to the growing challenge of finding qualified staff facing the metropolitan area's nonprofit hospitals. The program offers scholarships to nurses employed at any of the five participating hospitals who are seeking an RN certification or bachelor's degree in nursing. The program works through the continuing education efforts at each hospital.

Investment Report



While the specifics of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation's investment structure have undergone revisions over the past 39 years, the use of investment professionals has always played a key role. The Investment Committee works with carefully chosen investment managers who strive for the best possible return. In fiscal year 2008, the rate of return on the general investment pool was a -3.23 percent. This compares to a benchmark return of a -5.94 percent for a composite market index.

Investment Performance Pooled Investments

The investment policy of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation calls for a portfolio of stocks and bonds that is highly diversified. Capital preservation, protection against inflation and long-term growth are the fundamental objectives of the Community Foundation's investment strategy. Asset allocation and investment discipline are critical elements for good long-term investment performance.

Responsibility for investment policy and manager selection rests with a seven-member Investment Committee composed of four Trustees or former Trustees and three non-Trustee Oklahoma City community leaders with strong investment expertise. The fiscal year 2008 Investment Committee is listed on page 81.

This committee, along with investment counsel, Hotchkiss Associates LLC of Chicago, Illinois, determines asset allocation between equity and fixed income investments. Currently, the target percentage of the general pool invested in equities is 62.5 percent, with 32.5 percent in fixed income investments and 5 percent in cash.

To provide diversity in the portfolio, the committee addresses allocation to different styles of equity management and style-specific professional investment managers. Investment portfolios and performance are reviewed quarterly by the investment committee, with the managers being judged on a time horizon of three to five years. The benchmark used for the general investment pool return is a weighted average of the S&P500 index (65 percent) and the Lehman Intermediate Government Credit Index (35 percent). Individual managers are compared to style-specific market indices.

Independent Auditors' Report

NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OKLAHOMA CITY COMMUNITY FOUNDATION, INC. June 30, 2008

NOTE A--ORGANIZATION AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation") was incorporated December 30, 1968, under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, as a not-for-profit organization without capital stock to serve the charitable needs of the Oklahoma City area through the development and administration of endowment funds with the goal of preserving capital and enhancing its value for the benefit of the Oklahoma City area.

<u>Basis of Accounting</u>: The consolidated financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and, accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other assets and liabilities.

Reporting Entity: The consolidated financial statements include the assets, liabilities, net assets, changes in net assets, and cash flows of the Foundation. The Foundation has approximately 1,200 component funds and twenty-eight affiliated organizations.

Reporting Entity—Continued: The affiliated organizations are included with the Foundation in the accompanying consolidated financial statements because the Foundation has an economic interest in the organizations and controls the affiliated organizations' boards of trustees. Further, distributions made by the affiliated organizations exclusively benefit the charitable and educational purposes of the Foundation. All material inter-organization transactions have been eliminated.

<u>Basis of Presentation:</u> Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statements of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 116, Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made; No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations; and No. 136, Transfers of Assets to a Not-for-Profit Organization or Charitable Trust That Raises or Holds Contributions for Others.

Under SFAS 116 and 117, the Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets; unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. Contributions received are reported as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support, depending on the existence or nature of any donor restrictions. The standards also provide that if the governing body of an organization has the right to remove a donor restriction, the contributions should be classified as unrestricted net assets. The Foundation receives contributions from donors with advice regarding distribution of the assets and the earnings therefrom. The Foundation attempts to meet the desires expressed by the donors at the time of the contribution; however, the Foundation reserves the right to modify any restrictions or conditions on the distribution of funds for any specified charitable purpose or to specified organizations if, in the sole judgment of the Foundation's board of trustees, such restrictions or conditions become unnecessary, incapable of fulfillment or inconsistent with the charitable needs of the community. Accordingly, the consolidated financial statements classify all net assets as unrestricted, with the exception of assets related to charitable lead and remainder trusts, which are classified as temporarily restricted net assets due to the time restrictions of the assets.

SFAS 136 requires the Foundation to account for assets that are contributed by a not-for-profit organization for the benefit of that not-for-profit organization or one of its affiliated organizations as a liability to the specified beneficiary concurrent with its recognition of the assets received. All assets of this type, and the activity associated with those assets, are reported as agency transfers subject to SFAS 136 in the consolidated financial statements.

<u>Investments</u>: Securities and other investments are managed by various investment managers.

<u>Cash Equivalent Funds and Securities:</u> Cash equivalent funds, U.S. government obligations, asset backed obligations, bonds, mutual funds, equity index funds, bond index funds, and common and preferred stocks are reported at fair value in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. Fair values are based on quoted market prices, if available, or the best estimate of fair value determined by the Foundation or the investment manager. Realized gains and losses on sales of most U.S. government obligations and asset backed obligations are computed on the average cost basis. Realized gains and losses on sales of all other securities are determined using the first in first out (FIFO) method.

Cash equivalent funds are comprised of short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash.

Real Estate: Real estate is carried at cost or, if donated, the estimated fair value at the date of donation, net of accumulated depreciation of approximately \$1,721,000 and \$1,322,000 at June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively. Substantially all real estate is leased to a related party under four non-cancelable agreements which expire between 2010 and 2016. There are no expense obligations for the Foundation under these lease agreements. Future minimum payments under non-cancelable leases are expected to range from approximately \$639,000 to \$942,000 per year through 2013 and total \$1,098,000 thereafter.

<u>Limited Partnership Interests:</u> Investments in limited partnership interests are reported at estimated fair value. Fair value is generally determined by independent appraisal at the time the gift is made and is revalued periodically using information relating to the value of the underlying assets and other factors deemed relevant to the valuation.

<u>Other:</u> Other investments consist of investment assets which were donated to the Foundation. Other assets are carried at estimated fair value as determined by independent appraisal at the time the gift was made and are periodically revalued using similar valuation methods as the initial appraisal.

<u>Property and Equipment:</u> Property and equipment is carried at cost or, if donated, at the estimated fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The estimated useful lives are three to five years for furniture, fixtures, and equipment, and twenty to thirty years for buildings.

Contributions Receivable: Contributions receivable, which arise primarily from trusts and estates, are valued at present value at the financial statement date. This valuation assumes collection within one year; however, due to the nature of the receivables, the final settlement dates are uncertain. All amounts are expected to be fully collected. Contributions receivable are due from two donors at June 30, 2008 and one donor at June 30, 2007. No amounts have been recognized in the consolidated financial statements for conditional promises to give because the conditions on which they depend have not been substantially met. At June 30, 2008 and 2007, conditional promises to give total approximately \$1,240,000 and \$1,334,000, respectively.

<u>Collections:</u> The Foundation does not include either the cost or the value of its collections in the consolidated statements of financial position, nor does it recognize gifts of collection items as revenues in the consolidated statements of activities.

<u>Other Assets:</u> Other assets consist primarily of life insurance policies in which the Foundation is the beneficiary. These assets are carried at their cash surrender values and all other assets are carried at cost, or, if donated, at the fair value at the date of donation.

Assets Held for Others: Assets held for others represents the portion of assets related to charitable lead and remainder trusts that are held for the donor or other designated beneficiary and amounts due to recipients as agency transfers. The liability for assets held under trust agreements is equal to the present value of the expected future payments to be made to the donor or other designated beneficiary. The liability for assets held for others on agreements in which the Foundation is named as the charitable beneficiary but the designation is revocable is equal to the fair value of the assets. The liability for agency transfers totals \$10,000 at June 30, 2008 and 2007.

<u>Contributions Received:</u> Contributions received are generally recorded as unrestricted net assets. It is the expressed intention of the Foundation to honor the designations of donors; however, the Foundation reserves the right to exercise final control over all funds.

<u>Donated Assets:</u> Donated marketable securities and other noncash donations are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair values at the date of the donation.

<u>Donated Services:</u> No amounts have been reflected in the consolidated financial statements for donated services. The Foundation pays for most services requiring specific expertise.

<u>Grants and Program Services</u>: Grants and program services represent amounts awarded to various not-for-profit organizations to assist with funding of general operations or special programs. Grants and program services payable consist of unconditional amounts awarded, but not paid, to not-for-profit organizations. Grants to be paid after one year are discounted to net present value of estimated future cash flows. Grants dependent on the occurrence of a specified and uncertain event are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend are substantially met.

<u>Functional Allocation of Expenses:</u> The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the consolidated statements of activities. Costs are allocated between development, general and administrative, or grants and program services based on evaluations of the related activities. General and administrative expenses include those expenses that are not directly identifiable with any other specific function, but provide for the overall support and direction of the Foundation.

<u>Income Tax Status:</u> The Foundation and its affiliated organizations are exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(a) as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code"), and have been determined not to be a private foundation under Section 509(a) of the Code. As a result, income taxes are not included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

<u>Concentration of Credit Risk</u>: The Foundation maintains cash in bank deposit accounts that, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Foundation has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes that it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash or cash equivalents.

<u>Use of Estimates</u>: The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosed contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

<u>Significant Estimates:</u> Estimates that are particularly susceptible to significant change include the valuation of financial instruments, limited partnership interests, beneficial interests in charitable lead trusts, and contributions receivable.

The Foundation's various investment instruments and investments in financial instruments, partnerships, and beneficial interests in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of marketable securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statement of financial position. Significant fluctuations in fair values could occur from year to year and the amounts the Foundation will ultimately realize could differ materially. Management's estimate of beneficial interests and contributions receivable is based on consideration of all relevant available information and an analysis of the collectibility of individual contributions, which arise primarily from estates and bequests, at the financial statement date.

<u>Reclassifications</u>: Certain reclassifications have been made to the June 30, 2007, consolidated financial statements to conform to the classifications used at June 30, 2008.

NOTE D--SPLIT-INTEREST AGREEMENTS

At June 30, 2008 and 2007, the Foundation has recorded approximately \$8,688,000 and \$5,429,000, respectively, in fair value of various split-interest agreements as an asset in its consolidated statements of financial position. Assets received under these agreements are recorded at fair value and in the appropriate net asset category. Related contributions per the agreements are recognized as contribution revenue and are equal to the present value of future benefits to be received by the Foundation over the term of the agreements. Contribution revenue related to these agreements totaled approximately \$858,000 and \$1,004,000 in 2008 and 2007, respectively. Liabilities have been established for those split-interest agreements for which the Foundation is the trustee or for which the Foundation is obligated to an annuitant under a charitable gift annuity. These liabilities totaled approximately \$6,419,000 and \$3,505,000 at June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively. During the term of these agreements, changes in the value of the split-interest agreements are recognized in the consolidated statements of activities based on accretion of the discounted amount of the contribution, and reevaluations of the expected future benefits (payments) to be received (paid) by the Foundation (beneficiaries), based on changes in life expectancy and other assumptions. Discount rates ranging from 3.2% to 8.0% were used in these calculations at the dates of the contributions. Split-interest agreements for which the Foundation is the trustee but the charitable beneficiary is revocable are included in the assets and liabilities above. The liability for these revocable agreements is equal to the fair value of the assets.

The Foundation is the beneficiary of a charitable lead unitrust. Under the charitable lead trust agreement, the trust will pay 7% of the net fair market value of the trust estate to the Foundation over the next 16 years and the assets remaining at the end of the trust term will be distributed to a third party beneficiary. The fair value of the Foundation's beneficial interest is based on the present value of the estimated expected future cash inflows using discount rates of 3.8% and 5.6% at June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively. The Foundation recognized temporarily restricted contribution revenue of \$4,014,000 and unrestricted contribution revenue of approximately \$1,187,000 in 2007 related to this trust. The Foundation received distributions of approximately \$358,000 and reclassified the related net assets to unrestricted in 2008. Changes in fair value of the beneficial interest are reflected as a change in value of split-interest agreements in the consolidated statements of activities.

NOTE E--NOTES PAYABLE

Notes payable have been entered into which reflect balances of approximately \$323,000 and \$295,000 at June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively. This balance is comprised of two notes, both carrying a fixed interest rate of 6% and payable in monthly installments which total \$4,317. The notes mature on March 1, 2013 and May 1, 2017. Principal payments for 2009 through 2013 range from approximately \$33,000 to \$40,000 with payments thereafter totaling approximately \$138,000. The Foundation paid interest expense of \$20,500 and \$1,600 in 2008 and 2007, respectively, which is included in general and administrative expenses in the consolidated statements of activities. The notes are secured by readily marketable securities which are required to be maintained at the same value as the outstanding principal balance.

NOTE F--GRANTS AND PROGRAM SERVICES PAYABLE

Grants and program services payable consist of unconditional amounts awarded, but not paid, to various not-for-profit groups.

The Foundation's trustees have also approved conditional grants and program services totaling approximately \$253,000 and \$696,000 at June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively. No amounts have been recognized in the consolidated financial statements because the recipient agencies have not met certain conditions of the grant.

NOTE G--COLLECTIONS

The Foundation maintains various collections of works of art, historical treasures, and similar assets. These collections are maintained for public exhibition, education, and research in furtherance of public service rather than for financial gain. These assets are protected, kept unencumbered, cared for, and preserved by the Kirkpatrick Center Affiliated Fund. As a matter of policy, the proceeds of items in collections that are sold are used to acquire other items for collections.

The Foundation maintains nine separate collections, including the African Art Collection, Asian Art Collection, Boehm Collection, Baker Collection, Clock Collection, Payne Collection, Sutton Collection, Pre-Columbian Collection, and Victorian Doll House Collection. Each of these collections is subject to the policies referred to above.

NOTE H--CONTRIBUTED SERVICES

Several of the Foundation's trustees who assist the Foundation with special projects provide contributed services. No amounts have been recognized in the consolidated statements of activities because the criteria for recognition have not been satisfied.

NOTE I--RETIREMENT PLAN AND OTHER BENEFITS

Substantially all employees of the Foundation participate in the Retirement Plan of Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. (the "Plan"), commonly known as a Section 403(b) plan. Under the Plan, the Foundation contributes 10% of the respective employee's regular salary to provide retirement benefits. In addition, employees may contribute a specified percentage of their regular salary to the Plan. The total amount contributed by the Foundation and the employee cannot exceed 100% of the employee's regular salary, subject to Internal Revenue Service. Ilimitations. Contributions made by the Foundation are 100% vested after six years of service. Benefits paid under the Plan are limited to the sum of the employee's and the Foundation's contributions and investment earnings on those contributions. The Foundation contributed approximately \$134,000 and \$136,000 to the Plan during the years ended June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively.

The Foundation entered into severance benefit agreements with selected key executives. Split-dollar life insurance premiums of approximately \$169,000 and \$156,000 are included in other assets, and severance benefits payable of approximately \$331,000 and \$319,000 are included in accounts payable and other liabilities at June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively.

NOTE J--AGENCY TRANSFERS SUBJECT TO SFAS 136

The Foundation follows the provisions of SFAS 136, Transfers of Assets to a Not-for-Profit Organization or Charitable Trust That Raises or Holds Contributions for Others. This statement establishes standards for transactions in which the Foundation accepts a contribution from a donor and agrees to transfer those assets, the return on investment of those assets or both to another entity that is specified by the donor. SFAS 136 specifically requires that if a not-for-profit organization establishes a fund at a community foundation with its own funds and specifies itself or one of its affiliated organizations as the beneficiary of that fund, the community foundation must account for the transfer of such assets and the activity associated with those assets as a liability.

The Foundation maintains variance power, as described in the governing documents of the Foundation, and legal ownership over these funds and, as such, continues to report the funds as assets of the Foundation. Variance power assures donors that if the charitable purpose of their contribution becomes impractical or impossible, the distributions will be directed to similar purposes in the community. A liability for agency transfers subject to SFAS 136 has been established for the fair value of the assets contributed by not-for-profit organizations for their benefit in the amount of approximately \$74,923,000 and \$76,017,000 at June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively.
