Dear Donors:

We are pleased to provide you with the 2009 Donor Report. At the Oklahoma City Community Foundation we are very fortunate to have donors who are thoughtful and generous in their support of charitable organizations and projects. In times of economic turmoil, you continued to make gifts, recommend grants and create endowment funds. During fiscal year 2009, donors made gifts in excess of \$19 million and 44 new funds were started.

While our investment return for fiscal year 2009 was -14.6l percent for the general pool, we strongly believe that combined with your support, our commitment to a long-term investment strategy helped to buffer the most severe effects suffered by other foundations. In this publication we've included information about our fiscal year investment performance and a summary of our investment and distribution policies for your reference. In addition, the Donor Report includes the fiscal year 2009 fund value and distribution amounts for the charitable organization endowments and scholarship funds we administer.

Many of you made gifts within the last year to benefit one or more of the 280 endowments participating in the John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge. Thanks to your support, nearly \$4 million was added to these endowment funds. For a recap of the challenge, please see page 11.

We turned 40 years old in 2009. In place of galas and speeches, we opted to celebrate our anniversary by giving back to the community. Please see page 12 for a recap of our 40^{th} anniversary activities.

Commitment to quality, diversified investments helps buffer impact of volatile markets

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation's general investment pool had a total return of -14.61 percent. This annual return included one of the worst quarters in our 40-year history, -11.78 percent in the December 31 quarter, and one of the best quarters, 9.01 percent in the June 30 quarter. The volatility of the financial markets throughout the entire year has been well-noted in the press and felt in every sector of the world economy. While negative results are clearly not our investment goal, we were pleased to finish the year on a very positive note. As endowment fund investors, we have a long-term horizon. FY2009 was quite an investment storm, but we think that we have weathered through the worst and have opportunities for good investment returns in the coming quarters.

The investment performance awards for FY2009 will go to the "best of the worst." The average return for the 290 foundation endowments reporting to the Commonfund Benchmark Survey was -26.0 percent. Our return was in the top 20 percent for this group of foundations and our average investment cost of 37 basis points (0.37 percent) was approximately half of the median cost of 69 basis points reported by the Commonfund survey.

Our better-than-average return resulted from a number of both long-term and timely investment strategies. First and most

importantly, we have maintained a long-term diversification strategy with an allocation to high quality fixed-income assets, even in times of booming equity investments. That allocation and an investment commitment to high quality government bonds by fixed income managers produced a significant positive return of 5.38 percent for fixed-income investments for FY2009. Second, the Investment Committee had a very disciplined approach to rebalancing which it followed throughout the year. It did not sell out of equity positions and achieved a significant rebound in the fourth quarter as equities came back. Third, we did not have any illiquid investments, and in fact, maintained a larger-than-normal cash position, which provided plenty of liquidity to meet the cash requirements for grants and distributions.

The time horizon for our endowment assets is perpetual. We have and will continue to maintain the discipline required for a long-term investment strategy while utilizing short-term tactical allocations to add value when there is opportunity. The Investment Committee and our investment counsel, Hotchkiss Associates LLC, are all very committed to the long-term. And while FY2009 was certainly a test of the commitment to this discipline, we survived the test and are looking forward to the positive rewards that will come from continuing commitment to both diversification and quality investments.

Endowments benefit from low-cost, efficient investment program

The low cost and efficient operation of our investment program benefits all endowments, large and small. We accomplish this by balancing the use of active managers and index funds in a way that maximizes the opportunity for adding value but keeps the cost low. As a result, we have been able to produce annualized returns over 10 years that exceed the markets but at a cost which is much lower than mutual funds or other balanced fund alternatives.

For FY2009, the cost of investments at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation was 37 basis points, compared to more than 100 basis points for the average mutual fund or active equity fund manager requiring a large minimum account. For a \$50,000 fund that returns 8 percent over a 10-year period, this cost difference means approximately \$6,400 more in value to the fund. Over a 20-year period, the fee difference can amount to \$26,000 or more of added value to that same fund.

Diversification is a hallmark of a solid endowment investment policy and is one of the greatest advantages our investment program offers. The general investment pool is invested in all classes of domestic equities, in a range of fixed income securities and also has exposure to international markets. We provide a "balanced" portfolio by allocating assets to highly qualified managers in a widerange of investment classes. Due to the size of our investment pool, this level of equity exposure is available so that even the smallest funds benefit.

All Oklahoma City Community Foundation investments are overseen by an active committee of community leaders with strong investment expertise and are led by Hotchkiss Associates, LLC, an investment counsel that is an affiliate of United Capital Financial Advisers, Inc. (Please see page 3 for a list of investment managers and below for a list of committee members). All funds benefit from the expertise of this committee and their efforts to provide the best investment product at the most efficient price. For 40 years, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation has been the leading advocate for building endowment funds in the community. Utilizing a large investment pool that allows us to keep fees low is one of the greatest advantages we provide to the endowments we administer.



Investment Definitions

Growth Stock | Shares of a company that is growing earnings and /or revenues faster than its industry or the overall market. Typically, these companies pay little or no dividends, preferring to use income to finance further expansion. Growth stocks tend to have higher P/E ratios than the overall stock market because investors expect future earnings growth will be higher than it is currently.

Value Stock | A stock that appears undervalued relative to the value of its assets. A stock may be a "buy" as a value stock if its cash per share (or its book value) is high relative to its stock price. P/E ratios tend to be below growth stocks and the markets because investors expect future earnings growth to be less than it is currently. Dividend yields tend to be relatively high.

The Core Equity style | Designed to produce a market rate return with similar volatility (risk). This makes for a consistent investment strategy that is unaffected by short-term investment style themes such as growth vs. value. These assets are characterized by low stock turnover and low transactions cost. Core equity investing is a prudent way to preserve assets while at the same time participating in the long-term growth of the economy. Both large cap and small cap core equity investments are utilized.

Definitions of large, mid and small market capitalization vary, but could be reasonably considered as: Small cap - less than \$2 billion; mid cap - greater than \$2 billion but less than \$10 billion; large cap - greater than \$10 billion.

Price-to-Earnings (P/E) Ratio | A stock's price divided by its earnings per share, used as a method of valuation.

Distribution Policy stabilizes economic impact on endowments

Of primary importance to any endowment program are prudent distribution policies that will over a long-time horizon produce the maximum number of dollars for charitable causes or organizations. Spending rules are commonly used to provide a structured method of making distributions from an endowment fund that protects the distribution stream from inflation, provides a predictable annual distribution and allows the Investment Committee to focus on maximizing total investment return.

Since 1989, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation has employed a distribution policy that is designed to permit endowments to capitalize on good investment years as well as protect in the event of a low or negative return market. The extreme experience of declining markets in the past months underlines the importance of a policy that smooths the effects of market conditions on annual distributions from an endowment.

Cash distributions from most of the endowment funds of the Oklahoma City Community Foundation are based on a spending policy that calls for distributing 5 percent of the fund's average market value. The remaining investment return is left with the fund to add to the value, which over time protects future distributions from inflation. Our policy ensures that the annual distribution from the fund is more predictable because the amount is not tied to current income, which fluctuates due to shifts in market conditions, but is based on a rolling quarter average of the fund's market value, adjusted for additional contributions. The number of quarters used in the average ranges from 8 to 12, depending upon the type of fund.

"Large educational and institutional endowment managers across the country seem to agree that an amount close to 5 percent of the average market value is a safe amount to spend and still provide protection for the principal," says Carla Pickrell, director of administration for the Oklahoma City Community Foundation.

Charitable Organization Endowment Funds

Following are the charitable organization endowments at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation from which an annual distribution is made to the beneficiary organizations listed in the first column. The second column lists the fund value as of June 30, 2009 while the third column gives the total distribution amount for the year. In most cases, the distribution amount is based on 5 percent of the average market value of the fund over the previous 8 quarters. Affiliated funds may have different distribution policies based upon the documents that govern those funds.

Online Gifts

Cash

Cash is one of the easiest ways to make a charitable contribution. A cash contribution to a charitable organization endowment can be in the form of cash, check, money order or a cashier's check.

Real estate may be given at appraised value. If appreciated, long-term capital gains tax may be avoided on the real estate appreciation if the property is contributed directly to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Gifting real estate may allow you to preserve liquid assets while maximizing your charitable contributions.

Business-related Assets

We are able to accept gifts of individually-owned business assets such as closely-held C-corp. and S-corp. stock, partnerships and LLCs.

Stocks, Bonds and Mutual Funds

If appreciated, marketable or closely-held securities such as stocks, bonds and mutual funds can offer you significant tax savings while maximizing your charitable contributions. The securities may be given so that you receive an income tax deduction equal to the fair market value of the donated assets while avoiding the long-term capital gains tax. We maintain accounts at most brokerage firms and can arrange for the transfer of the donated securities.

Oil and Gas Interests & Royalty Interests

Both oil and gas royalty interests may also be donated to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation for the benefit of a charitable organization endowment. The contribution of oil and gas interests may allow for the preservation of liquid assets while maximizing the charitable contributions.

Life Insurance

Life insurance can be an effective means to fund a charitable gift without significant outlays of cash. Simply designate a charitable organization endowment, an advised fund or scholarship endowment as the beneficiary.

In 2007, the couple established a Legacy Fund and they have included a bequest in their estate plans that will eventually benefit the fund, ensuring their continued support for the arts and other charitable interests.



John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge

In 2008, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation and the Kirkpatrick Family Fund launched a matching grant opportunity in recognition of the 100th anniversary of the birth of our founder, John E. Kirkpatrick. The John Kirkpatrick Centennial Endowment Challenge was significant in both its meaning and the opportunity to increase the endowments of both charitable organizations and scholarship funds. Mr. Kirkpatrick funded seven endowment matches over a 20-year period beginning in 1979. He truly loved to see the endowments funds grow and he especially liked that the match challenges attracted new donors for the organizations.

The grant opportunity offered participating endowments – both for charitable organizations and scholarship funds – a dollar-fordollar match up to \$5,000 for contributions made to their funds at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation between February 1 and December 31. In addition, the Kirkpatrick Family Fund also offered a larger match opportunity – the 100th Birthday Celebration Challenge – to 23 organizations with specific endowment building plans. These organizations had until June 30, 2009 to

complete their matches. Between the two match opportunities, 280 charitable organization endowments and scholarship funds participated and increased their funds by nearly \$4 million thanks to more than 3,000 gifts. The success of both challenges carried on the legacy of Mr. Kirkpatrick and we believe he would be very pleased with the results.

The idea of building endowments for the benefit of the community is a central piece of our mission. Including Charitable Giving in Your Estate Plans

At the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, you have many options to include charitable giving in your estate plans. The options outlined below are designed to help you make charitable gifts while enjoying tax benefits and preserving financial security for yourself and loved ones. They also make it possible for your generosity to continue making a difference for many generations. For more information, contact Joe Carter at 405/606-2915.

Charitable Gift Annuities

A charitable gift annuity (CGA) provides individuals 55 years or older with not only income for life but also the peace of mind of making a difference through a lasting gift to the community. Through a CGA, you can make a gift with cash or other assets of at least \$20,000, receive income for life and, at the end of the annuity, the remaining assets will go to the charitable fund or funds of your choosing. We offer six CGA options.

Charitable Remainder Trusts

A charitable remainder trust allows you to place assets in a trust that pays annual income to you or a beneficiary for life or a term of years. You can avoid capital gains tax on the donated assets and also receive an income tax deduction for the fair market value of the remainder interest of the trust. In addition, the trust is removed from the estate, reducing subsequent estate taxes. Upon the trust's termination, the remaining assets will benefit an existing endowment or advised fund.

Charitable Lead Trusts

A charitable lead trust allows you to transfer assets to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation that then pays a percentage of the assets' value to an endowment you've designated. At the end of the trust term, the remaining assets are passed on to designated heirs. Charitable lead trusts offer several advantages including greatly discounted gift or estate taxes and any growth in the assets will be free of these taxes for the heirs. In certain cases, a charitable lead trust may also provide an income tax deduction at the time the trust is created.

Retirement Plan Assets

Retirement plan assets are subject not only to estate taxes, but also income taxes. To reduce this burden on heirs and to create a charitable legacy, you can use any retirement plan asset to maximize charitable contributions by establishing an Advised Fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Your heirs can serve as advisors to the fund, ensuring that your charitable interests are continued into the future. NOTE: If you will be 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ years of age in 2009, you may want to consider a charitable IRA rollover.

Bequests

With a bequest, you can designate a percentage, the residual or their entire estate to benefit an existing fund or to establish a new fund. This option may provide you and your family with substantial reductions in federal estate taxes. We offer sample bequest language at www.occf.org.

Celebrating Giving Back to the Community

Our 40th anniversary in 1969 offers a reason to celebrate and acknowledge the impact we've helped donors make over the past four decades. In place of galas and speeches to mark this special milestone, we focused our celebration on several key projects that gave back to the community on a variety of levels. Below are highlights of 40th anniversary projects:

2009 Guidance Counselor Summer Institute

The Central Oklahoma Guidance Counselor Network is a vital part of our Trustee Scholarship Initiative and provides an important support system for the participating counselors representing 50 high schools. Through the network, we provide free resources including workshops so the counselors can utilize the information to encourage their students to aspire to higher levels of educational achievement after high school and to explore a broader range of opportunities.

In 2009, we coordinated the Guidance Counselor Summer Institute, a two-day training workshop at Meinders School of Business on the campus of Oklahoma City University. The institute was taught by members of the College Board and was open to all network counselors at no cost. During the institute, the instructors covered relevant topics such as working with undocumented, tribal and first-generation students, writing letters of recommendation and communicating with colleges and universities. Thirty-five counselors attended the institute.

"I found this to be extremely valuable as I have only been in the profession for one year," said participant Ashley B. "I will definitely have a better understanding of what I can do for my students in the future."

Get Reading Oklahoma

Recent statistics show that more than 140,000 adults living in Oklahoma County read at or below the basic literacy level. To address the situation and to find a way to reach a greater number of adults, the Oklahoma City Community Foundation purchased the broadcast rights to two innovative adult literacy television series created by PBS LiteracyLink – TV411 and GED Connection – and arranged to have them broadcast statewide both on OETA and Cox Cable.

TV411 is a 30-episode television series created by PBS that is designed to give adults strategies for managing their family's health and finances while improving their literacy skills so they can serve as their own best advocates. The episodes use everyday situations in order to improve and expand vocabulary, calculate sales prices or interest rates and understand family health and nutrition.

GED Connection is a 39-episode program that helps adults who are studying for the GED exam. The programs include all five subject areas covered on the exam. Episodes for both programs are 30 minutes in length. Get Reading Oklahoma has brought together a wide range of partners for whom we are very thankful: Oklahoma Department of Libraries, Central Oklahoma Workforce Investment Board, Oklahoma Department of Education, the Metropolitan Library System, the Oklahoma Department of Corrections and Tyler Media. "The Get Reading Oklahoma materials are a great complement to our tutoring program," says Mary Young, director of Project Read, a nonprofit organization based in Edmond, Okla., that provides tutoring for adults. "They are relevant, repeatable and something a learner can utilize on their time schedule. And best of all, they come in a medium that really speaks to the adult population."



"Putting Down Roots"

In 2003, the Oklahoma City Planning Department published "Putting Down Roots," a 116-page guide to choosing and taking care of trees best suited for central Oklahoma landscapes. The guide features full-color photos and information about the more than 50 trees appropriate for Oklahoma landscapes and is made available free of charge to city residents. In 2009, the department updated the publication and a grant from the Oklahoma City Community Foundation will ensure the publication remains free to the public. We will dedicate the publication to one of our donors, Margaret Annis Boys.

Downtown In December

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation is the 2009 presenting sponsor of the Free Museum Sundays during Downtown in December, an annual celebration produced by Downtown OKC since 2001. The celebration offers family-friendly activities throughout a 10-block area of the downtown area. In 2009, Free Museum Sundays will involve four museums instead of two. The participating museums are the Oklahoma City Museum of Art, the American Banjo Museum, the Oklahoma City National Memorial and the Oklahoma Heritage Museum. During the five-week Downtown in December event, each museum will be open free of charge one Sunday and on the final and fifth Sunday, all four will be open to the public at no costs.
