Through a charitable gift from their individual retirement account (IRA), Jim and LaVerna Cobb created an endowment fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation that will forever benefit students at Oklahoma State University. The Cobbs made the IRA distributions without having to recognize the distributed assets as income thanks to the IRA Charitable Rollover provision that is scheduled to end Dec. 31, 2011.

What is an IRA Charitable Rollover?

In 2006, federal legislation was passed that included a provision permitting individuals age 70% or older to distribute up to \$100,000 from their IRA to an eligible charitable organization like the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. Individuals may exclude the amount distributed directly to an eligible charity from their gross income.

How Do I Make an IRA Charitable Rollover?

It's easy! Notify your IRA administrator or trustee to make the distribution directly to an existing endowment fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation or you can create a new endowment fund. We can provide you with a sample letter to your IRA administrator requesting the distribution.

When does the IRA Charitable Rollover end?

Unless Congress votes to extend the provision, only those distributions made prior to Jan. 1, 2012 will qualify.

The clock is ticking for anyone who is 70½ or older to use an IRA required minimum distribution to make a charitable gift and not count the distribution as income!

Thanks to a federal provision known as the IRA Charitable Rollover, eligible individuals can make gifts from their IRA accounts up to \$100,000 to qualified charitable organizations such as the Oklahoma City Community Foundation. **This provision applies only to those distributions made prior to Jan. 1, 2012.**
