Great Expectations: Transforming Lives

After nine years in the classroom, Montie Koehn was burned out. Her principal encouraged Montie to attend a four-day Great Expectations workshop before she made any decisions about her future.

"I walked in with trepidation, but by the third day, I was on fire and inspired," she recalls. "It transformed me and I had a huge change of heart and couldn't wait to get back into my classroom."

After 22 years of working in the Oklahoma City Public School District, Montie was hired as principal at Kennedy Elementary School in Norman. At Kennedy, her mission was to create a

climate of mutual respect, promote high expectations for all students and provide a structure where students took ownership for their behavior. After the first year, 28 teachers attended a Great Expectations summer institute and were excited to return to school to implement the practices. The results have helped create increased student achievement, a reduction in behavior referrals and an overall positive learning environment for students and staff.

"Ever since I attended my first Great Expectations session, I knew it was something special," she says. "I've seen the program change the attitudes and behaviors of teachers and students time and time again."

Founded in 1991 and headquartered in Tahlequah, Okla., Great Expectations is a school transformation model that emphasizes a climate of mutual respect and academic excellence. The organization's workshops instruct teachers and principals on how to create harmony and excitement within a school, elements

that Linda Dzialo, the organization's president, says are basic elements for academic excellence. She adds that the program's focus on improved student self-esteem, attendance, discipline and parent participation results in proven academic achievement. Great Expectations has trained more than 44,000 educators in 18 states, Mexico, U.S. Virgin Islands and Okinawa, Japan.

The success of the program has resulted in recommended grants from several advised funds at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation including the 7-Eleven Stores advised fund.
